**Marcia Sully Is District Winner, Lions Contest**

Marcia Sully, a sixteen-year-old highly commended for her impromptu, a satirical talk on war toys.

Speeches by other contestants were on students and their place in the modern economy, the United Nations and the power and freedom of the press.

A panel of six judges scored the speakers on the basis of the presentation, subject matter and academic value. Judges at the April 1 contest were W. E. Eaton of Agincourt, Jack Tummon, administrator of the Lakeshore Board of Education, David Coon, a Stouffville lawyer, Elgin Coutts, QC of Leaside, Grey Cavanagh, vice-principal of Bloor Collegiate and B. T. O'Beirn, principal of King City Composite School.

As well as the judges, there were two tellers, two timers, and Alf Hill of the Markham-Unionville Lions Club was the impromptu control officer.

Lions officials emphasize that the contestants never have the same judge twice and rarely are there more than six contestants at any preliminary.

A total of 69 secondary schools have been represented in the contest and close to 7,000 students have participated.

For her win at her school, Marcia received \$10; at the regional contest she was given a cheque for \$75. At the semi-finals she also received a cheque for \$75, and the District Governor's Trophy.

At the Owen Sound finals, she will have a chance to win \$150 cash and a \$300 scholarship to the University of her choice. One boy and one girl in both the English and French sections of the contest will win this prize. Other contestants will receive graded prizes.

Marcia is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Sully, Elgin Mills Sideroad. She has always taken an interest in public speaking and won the grade 9 plaque at her high school. However, this is the first time she has ever competed outside her own school.

Each of the contestants was required to give a prepared speech of not less than five minutes and not more than six. They were then given 15 minutes to prepare an impromptu speech.

Marcia's speech, the same one which saw her given top place at her school and at the region contest on March 1 at Thornhill, was on the subject
