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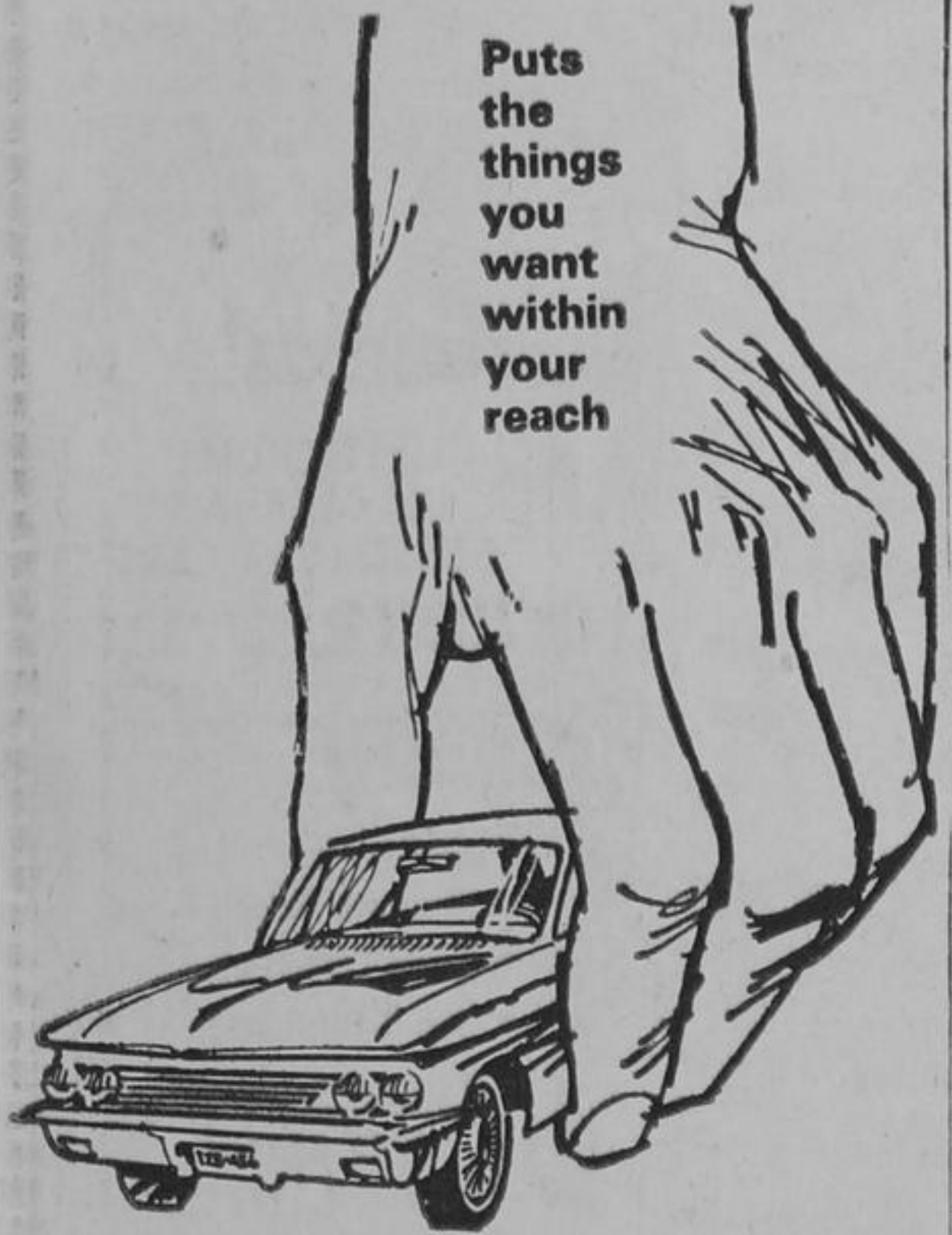
Mark-Vaun WI

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Mkham. Twp. Rejects Richmond Hill Request To Contribute To Pool

A request from Richmond Hill and District Centennial Pool Committee asking Markham Township Council to contribute to its pool, which it said would be available to Markham residents, was turned down "with regrets" by council last week.

Council at first decided to refer the request to committee, but changed its mind after Councillor Alan Sumner suggested the matter be settled then.

"If we're giving consideration to our centennial project, I believe any money we have should be used for our own project," Mr. Sumner said.

Council agreed.

Another suggestion by Councillor Sumner that council not take any action on a request from Satfleets Township Council, was voted down by council.

The Saltfleet proposal called for council to help it petition the legislative assembly for police grants. Such grants would both "standardize" police services throughout the province and provide better ones, the petition said.

Said Councillor Sumner: "I thought the capital grant covered that. I believe this petition is unnecessary."

Deputy-reeve Stewart Rumble's motion that the matter be referred to the police committee, was agreed to 3-1.

An application by Mrs. D. Waddington to operate an antique shop on the south side of Highway 7 and the third concession, was approved by council.

Awarded \$76,000 In Air Crash Lawsuit

A local widow and three children of a man killed in the TCA crash at St. Therese, Quebec, in November 1963, were awarded \$76,000 in settlement approved last week by the Ontario Supreme Court.

Mrs. George Francis of Lawrence Avenue will receive \$50,000. She is a nurse with the local Victorian Order of Nurses. Ruth 12, Richard 8 and Tracey 6 will share \$23,000 and costs amounted to \$3,000.

The out-of-court settlement was reached without TCA, now Air Canada, admitting liability.
