Richmond Hill High Athletes Win GB Meet

Richmond Hill High School athletes piled up 210 points to win a Georgian Bay four school zone trial track and field meet. Pickering College, Newmarket, finished second with 99. Newmarket had 79 and Stouffville 63.

Richmond Hill's Mac Smith cleared the bar at 5 feet 3 inches to equal the junior high jump record and Pickering's Doug Moore added five inches in the senior shotput with a heave of 46 feet 111/2 inches to set a new record.

Five competitors won two events each to share the lead in the senior competition. Richmond Hill's Rick Bradshaw won the long jump and the 100yard dash.

Doug Acomb and Vic Folliott of Richmond Hill collected three firsts each. Acomb won the 440, 880 and triple jump. Folliott placed first in hurdles, long jump and pole vault.
