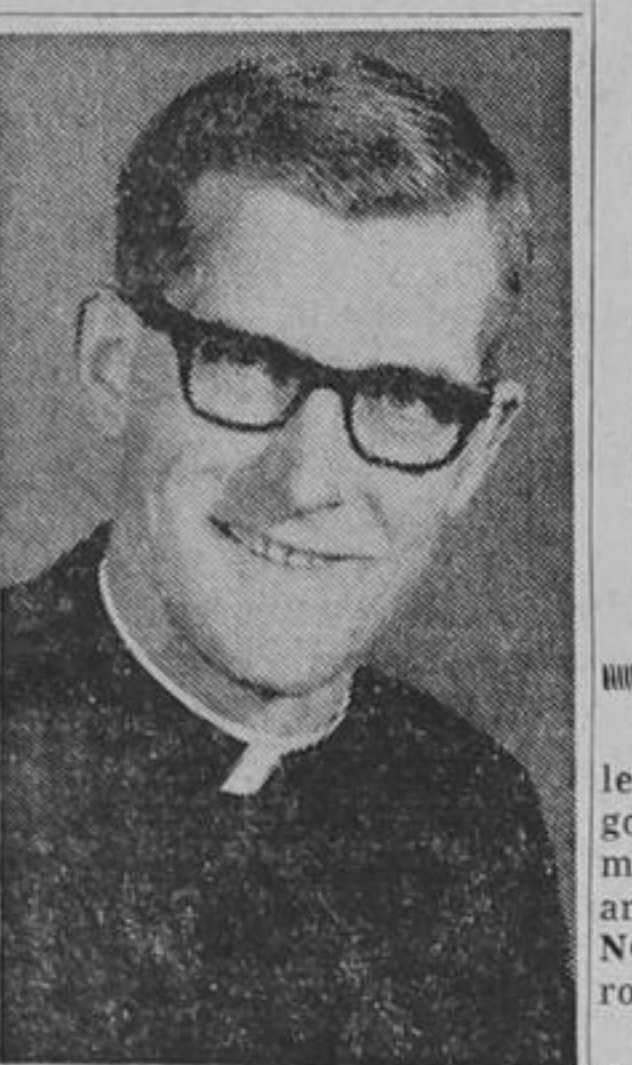
The Richmond Hill Symphony Orchestra held their last rehearsal of the season May 16 at the library.
