Welfare officers feel they learn new things every day about care for the aged, and efforts are now being made to avoid isolating homes for the aged. The new trend is to build them near communities. A special effort is made to place homes for the aged near housing for elderly persons.

Charitable Institutions

These are private homes for the aged operated by charitable organizations, church, ethnic and other

Arrangements to enter these institutions should be made directly through the organization which has its own admission rules. However, since the province makes considerable grants to these institutions, it asks that persons admitted should have one year's

residence in Ontario. There are 61 charitable institutions in Ontario, five of which have bed care areas. Eighteen of these homes in the Metro area provide space for about 2,000 residents, accounting for about half of the accommodation of this type in the province.

It must be understood that homes for the aged are not hospitals. In all situations where health is a problem, the family doctor's confidential report and a personal examination, enable the physician to the home to decide whether or not home care. rather than hospital treatment is to the individual's advantage. In any event the required medical examination helps the home authorities to counsel the prospective resident and his family.

The Department of Public Welfare exercises general supervision of these homes and shares equally with the municipalities in the costs of construction and expansion-so that 50% of the required social capital is provided by the province The provincial and federal governments also contribute 70% of the continuing costs of operation and
