Two Ambulance Services Approved

Markham Township, which has been operating with limited ambulance service, will soon have the sirens whistling at it from all sides of the township. Meeting Monday night, council approved the proposal of John Vance to provide ambulance service in the township, and only a difference in interpretation kept it from hiring David Holt of Vaughan-Hill ambulance, as well.

following a meeting with the two men last week. Vance, who already has a contract with Markham Village, will provide one full-time operator with 10 men on standby and will require a \$400 yearly subsidy from Markham Township.

Holt's proposal called for a monthly payment of \$200 from each municipality involved. He has three fully-equipped ambulances and would provide two full-time men, plus any extra men required, all of whom are St. John Ambulance trained.

Although the latter proposal was turned down in favor of Vance's, council adopted another recommendation stemming from a meeting with representatives from Vaughan Township and Richmond Hill last week.

At that time, the three municipalities agreed to split the costs of ambulance service, as provided by Holt, with Richmond Hill paying 52.7 per cent of the \$400 monthly subsidy; Vaughan, 32.7, and Markham, 14.6.

The percentages were based on the number of calls made in the three areas in 1964.

Monday night, however, council was unable to decide how they had agreed to split the costs. Township Clerk H. C. T. Crisp, thought the proposal called for 14.6 of the annual subsidy of \$4,800, while Deputy-reeve Stewart Rumble and Councillor Cleary Palmer, who attended the meeting on the issue, thought it was to be based on 14.6 per cent of anything over \$2,400, the latter the amount to be paid by Richmond Hill for the balance of the year.

Said Councillor Alan Sumner: "That will make it either \$360 or \$720. I'm not going to kick at either one."

Mr. Rumble said he and Mr. Palmer had gone to the meeting with nothing to offer, but had agreed to "go along" with a small amount.

Said Councillor Charles Hoover: "If we have two different operators, will there be a confusion about boundary lines?"

Mr. Rumble said the two services would have the whole of the township as their territory.

"I don't know why we're getting this other fellow at all," said Mr. Hoover.

Council then agreed to put it over for while until it could get the matter clarified.

Pruning Procedures Demonstrated At Horticultural Society's Meeting

J. A. Weall, a well-known garden expert from the Ontario Agricultural College was guest speaker at the May meeting of the Richmond Hill Horticultural Society.

Mr. Weall demonstrated the correct way to prune shrubs and trees. Most shrubs should be pruned after flowering, he said, with the exception of roses and hydrangeas which flower on new wood and therefore should be cut back early in the growing season.

When discussing lilacs, Mr. Weall noted that old blooms should be removed immediately after flowering to prevent the formation of seed pods which take energy which should be going into next year's bloom.

Mr. Weall stressed that when planting out new shrubs and trees, some of the top growth should be removed to give the root system time to become established. Hedges, particularly, he said must be pruned drastically to encourage them to grow densely all the way up from the ground. He suggested it would be wise to remove about one third of the top growth when setting out new hedges.

Evergreens should be pruned toward the end of May, Mr. Weall said, when the cuts will be covered by new growth.

Because of the late spring, the daffodil show scheduled for May 5 was held in conjunction with the tulip show on May 25. At that time, also, members received their premiums, a chrysanthemum plant.

Reserve Judgment On Careless Driving Case

Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake reserved judgment in a hearing against a Downsview man when he appeared in magistrate's court last week on a charge of careless driving.

"I'd like to think this one over," said the magistrate after hearing evidence that James Davis had acted in anything but a rational manner when arrested by Constable Arthur Haney in Richmond Hill, February 9.

Constable Haney testified that he had stopped Davis after he had gone through a stop sign at Crosby Avenue and Newkirk Road. After writing out a traffic ticket, the accused had snatched it away from him and sped off in his car, Constable Haney said.

The quick getaway had brushed the policeman back and in trying to keep his balance, his foot had slipped so that the back wheel of the car had gone over it. He was not hurt, however.

"I yelled at him and he stopped," the witness said.

Davis said he hadn't driven off hastily, nor had he grabbed the ticket away from the policeman. He also denied using obscene language as alleged by the officer.

Magistrate Hollinrake asked Crown Attorney Arleigh Armstrong if he weren't considering some other charge, such as resisting arrest.

"I'm wondering if a provincial statute is being used to cover one (charge) of a criminal nature," said Mr. Hollinrake. "The evidence before me is one of a criminal offence. The case was remanded until June 3.
