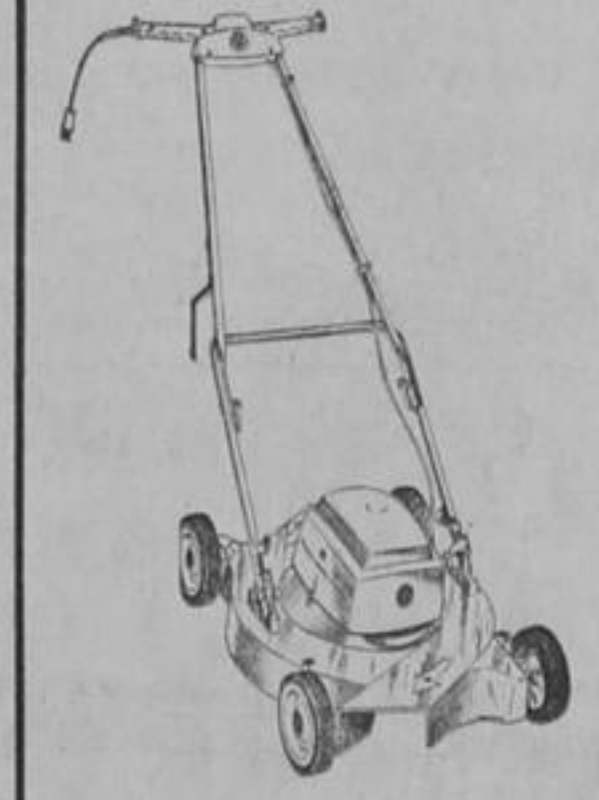
**Neighborhood Notes**

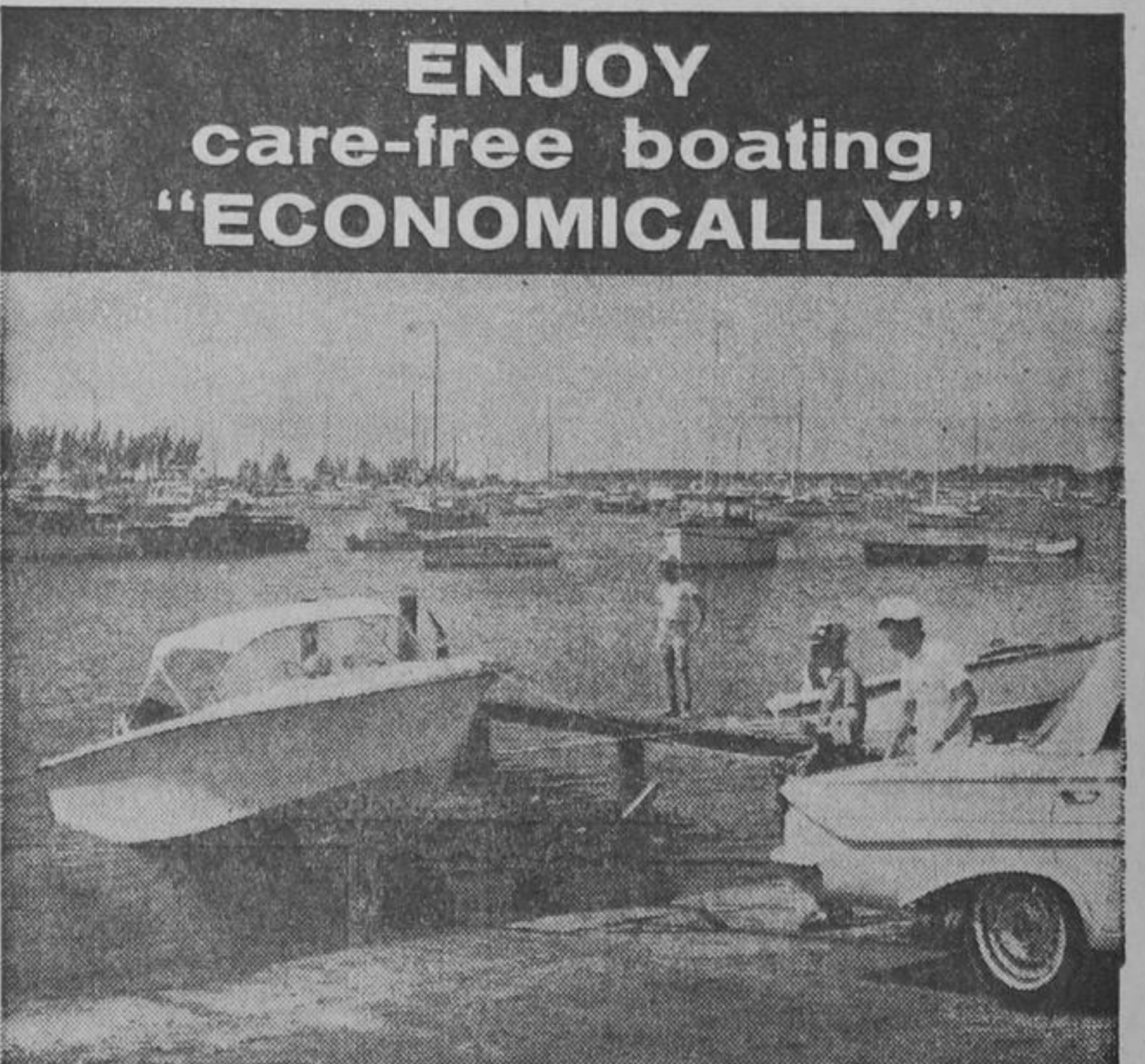
