

Luck Was All Bad For This Beginner

Beginner's luck was all bad for a Richmond Hill youth when he went driving last week.

According to Vaughan Township Police, Wayne Bardeau, 18, of 319 Boisdale Ave., who holds a 90-day beginner's permit, got some gas the hard way when he ran into some pumps after turning into a filling station at Yonge Street and Elgin Mills Road. About \$500 damage was done to the car.

Bardeau told police that his brakes failed.

Brakes also played a big part in an accident at Bathurst Street, near the Campbell Side-road, June 10.

Involved was Ronald Powell, 44, of Aurora, who told police he braked to slow down while driving south on Bathurst Street, swerved and rolled over the left embankment.

Both Powell and his daughter, Denise Powell, 16, suffered injuries and were treated by a doctor in Aurora.

Damage to the car was estimated at \$1,000.

Pat E. Smith Resigns Moving To Lakehead

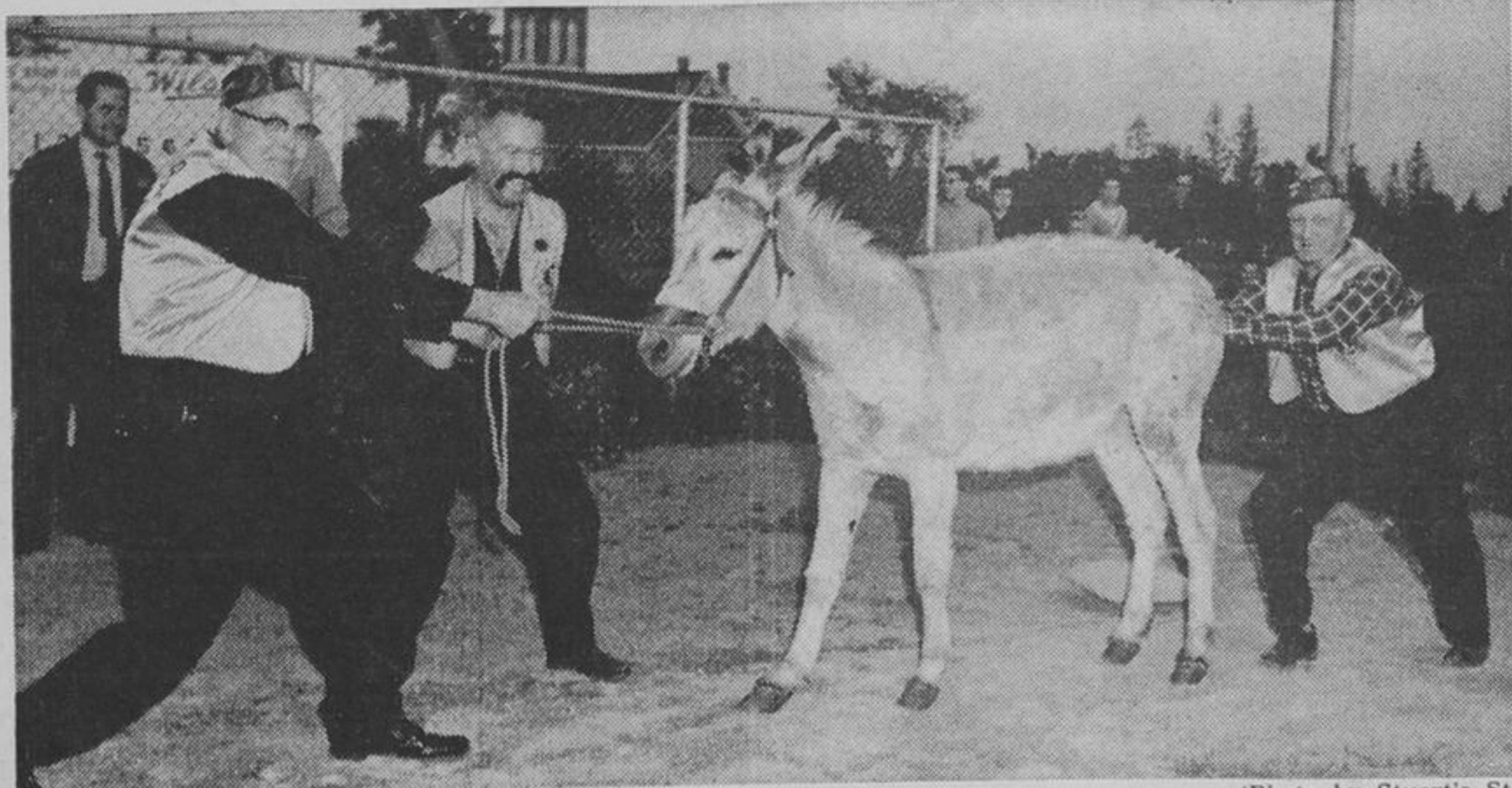
The resignation of Pat E. Smith from the retarded children's authority was accepted by town council with regret Monday evening.

Crosby Walkway

Representatives of Richmond Hill Public School Board met with the works committee June 8 and clarified the town's involvement in the board's request for provision of a surfaced walkway in the general area of Sussex Avenue, north from Centre Street to Crosby Avenue.

The works committee reported to council Monday evening that following a general review of the proposal, and in keeping with requirements of both parties, the following course of action was agreed upon:

1. That the works commissioner prepare and submit a site plan detailing the walk layout, with a profile, for the board's information.

2. That the town be responsible for obtaining the necessary right-of-way to locate the proposed walk, in time for its construction and use, if possible, by the requested date of September 1, 1965.

3. Chairman W. H. Hutchinson tentatively agreed, subject to approval of the board, that the board would be responsible for the cost of construction and maintenance of the walk.

4. That a copy of the layout plan detail of the portions to be located on the green-belt be forwarded to the parks board for their consideration and approval.

Council approved this agreement reeve Floyd Perkins explained that when the walkway had been first discussed with the school board, that body had been considering buying a school site south of Crosby Avenue and the walkway could have been provided on land already owned by the town.

The town had intended acquiring only an easement through the land south of Crosby for installation of the forceman, but the school board's need for a walkway has changed the situation.

Vaughan By-Law Prohibits Night Dump Use, Demands Rat Control

A by-law prohibiting dumping in either privately operated or township dumps between the hours of 10 in the evening and seven in the morning, and at any time on Sunday, was passed by Vaughan Township Council Monday June 14, in spite of the opposition of both the reeve and deputy-reeve.

"The CN is concerned about this," said Deputy-reeve Garnet Williams. "They want to dump at night". Mr. Williams felt that before the by-law was passed consideration should be given to permitting industries within the township to dump at night if they wished. "It's a hardship to them to have to dump in the daytime," he said.

It was pointed out by Councillor Warren Bryce that it was a hardship for residents of the township to have garbage trucks roaring up and down the roads at night. "In the interests of the people who live in the township the CN should make another arrangement", said Mr. Bryce. "It won't be any tremendous hardship. The CN is large enough to make some arrangement to hold their garbage over until 7 am."

Mr. Bryce's motion that the by-law be given a third and final reading was seconded by Councillor Sam Kaiser, who

felt that it was the overloaded garbage trucks using the roads at night which made the most litter along the roads. With Councillor Dalton McArthur absent, the vote was two to one in favor of the motion. As it was a recorded vote, Reeve A. H. Rutherford attempted to cast an opposition vote but was reminded by the deputy-clerk that he could only cast a vote to break a tie.

Mr. Bryce's concern to have the by-law passed speedily was because it also contains a clause requiring all dumps in the township to be serviced once weekly by professional exterminators using poisoned bait to exterminate rats and other vermin.

Control of rats had been requested by a local farmer who said rats, driven out of the dumps by fire, had been infesting his farmlands.

The by-law controlling hours of operation of dumps and requiring rat control carries a maximum fine of \$300 for each offence.
