## Your Legion Reports

Branch 375, Royal Canadian Legion

The branch received news of the death of Comrade John Kenneth Reynolds on July 6 with deep regret. He leaves behind his wife Winnifred, son Gary and daughter Sheila. Our late comrade joined the Royal Canadian Engineers at age 21 and served with the army in Europe for six years. He died at the age of 46.  
At the going down of the sun, and in the morning, we will remember them.  
The Legion was honored recently with a visit by admiral of the fleet the Right Honorable Earl Mountbatten of Burma. He was in Ottawa for one day on a tour of various Commonwealth countries paying farewell visits as retiring chief of the U.K.'s Defence Staff. While in Ottawa he paid calls on the Governor General, the Prime Minister and Defence Minister.  
Lord Mountbatten is also grand president of the British Commonwealth Ex-Services League, and his thoughtfulness in taking time out from a busy schedule to be with the Legion's national leaders for almost three hours is characteristic of his personal concern for the welfare of ex-servicemen and women in all Commonwealth countries.  
At a luncheon at Legion House the grand president discussed with lively interest the activities of the Legion and BCEL, and delivered an interesting address. Speaking on disbursements of the BCEL Welfare Fund he said: "Among the foremost of these was the Royal Canadian Legion's scholarship scheme for children of deserving ex-servicemen in Nigeria, which came about as a direct result of a visit to Nigeria in January 1964 by Mr. Thompson, your Dominion secretary."  
Lord Mountbatten—who likes to be called "Lord Louis" by old comrades in arms—is pre-eminently a man in step with the times, tested by the hard battles and high commands of war, experienced in statecraft and learned in science. He has been described by the most ordinary of the ablest of seamen as "the best skipper we ever sailed under."  
During the first 21 months of the last world war he led the 5th destroyer flotilla from HMS Kelly and became a legendary figure whose exploits thrilled the world. The adventures of Lord Louis and the "Kelly" will be read in years to come like the romance of Sir Francis Drake and the "Golden Hind". A most powerful movie, Noel Coward's naval drama "In Which We Serve", was based in part on the equally thrilling life story of Captain Mountbatten RN, and HMS Kelly.

## Vaughan Supervisors Report Progress

Reports of supervisors of the work carried out in Vaughan Township schools during the school year just completed were presented to the township school board at its July meeting by Superintendent D. R. MacDonald.  
Music  
Hugh Martin, supervisor and his assistant Robert Richardson report continued progress in the quality of the music program in most classrooms due to increased enthusiasm on the part of teachers. Sight reading has been emphasized and correlation between the tonic-solfa and use of letter names has been secured by use of glockenspiels. Groups have performed in concerts and at public functions and many pupils participated successfully in the Kiwanis, York and Newmarket music festivals.  
Art  
Mrs. Lorraine Mandelbaum, supervisor, reports picture-making with various media and basic skills in papercraft were emphasized during the year. The supervisor made regular visits to classrooms to demonstrate techniques and discuss programs with the teacher, organized workshops during the fall and spring terms and provided bulletins of ideas for art activities to aid teachers.  
Special projects undertaken were: a display of art at various grade levels at the time of the teachers' professional development day; development of a set of 35 mm slides of bulletin board displays and classroom activities to be used in in-service training projects; a start on outlining a curriculum in art from kindergarten to grade 8 for the area, which will include suggestions for teaching various skills and techniques.  
Primary Division  
Throughout the year, Mrs. Etharal Zimmerman, has emphasized the reading program in the primary division and has given valuable aid to teachers in grouping children for instruction, selection of suitable readers for special groups and choice of teaching methods and materials.  
During the fall Mrs. Zimmerman supervised administration of a learning ability test and a paragraph reading test to all grade 3 pupils. These same tests were given to grade 2 pupils during the spring, and at the end of the school year, a vocabulary test was given to all grade 1 pupils under her direction.  
During the spring term also, attention was given to introducing the newer concepts of mathematics in primary grades. Workshops were organized to discuss the new approach and samples of new books were circulated among the teachers for study.  
In addition to the help given teachers on her regular visits, the supervisor organized several workshops and produced a number of valuable bulletins on various topics. Plans have been made to outline courses in social studies and science for grades 1 to 3 during the fall term.

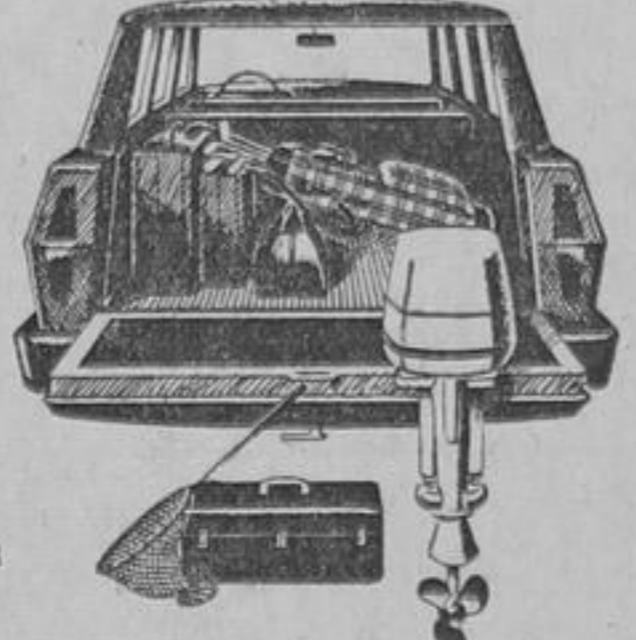
