## Trustee Donald Findlay Suggests Water Meters For King City Residents

A motion by Trustee Donald Findlay that water meters be installed in all buildings using water in King City was discussed briefly at the July 12 meeting of the village trustees but put over to the next meeting for further study.

"I am not satisfied personally that water is being conserved," said Trustee Findlay in introducing his resolution. In the preamble it was noted that it is the duty of all on this continent to conserve water, including residents of King City, and that rates should be designed to this end.

The resolution further suggested that King Township should be asked to include in the debentures for the village's third well enough to pay for the installation of the water meters.

Trustees Ross Farquhar, who was acting chairman in the absence of Chairman John Mann felt that meters were the only fair way of distributing water. However, he foresaw some difficulty in reading them, etc. and suggested the matter be held in abeyance until the next meeting.

Water consumption for the month of June averaged 162,805 gallons per day and was up 1,900,000 gallons over the May consumption. It was reported however that the water supply situation was still healthy. Trustee Farquhar reported that several vacant lots, park land and other municipal property were in need of mowing and suggested that the township should be asked if mowers are available to mow them.

Secretary-manager G. T. Thompson noted that it was best to wait until the weeds had attained full growth before having them cut. It was left to Mr. Thompson to make arrangements for this at the best time. It was reported that there had been no reply to the trustees' recent letter to King Township with respect to the grade separation at the main intersection in the village. Trustee Findlay gave notice that if word were not received by the next meeting he would introduce a motion to take the matter up directly with the County of York as is their privilege under Section 500 of the Municipal Act. Final ratification was given at the meeting to a by-law expropriating the Shatka property for park purposes. The seven-acre property is adjacent to the village park.

## King City Trustees Apply For Incorporation

The Ontario Municipal Board has set October 12 as the date for the hearing of the application of King City for incorporation. A letter containing this information was read at the July 12 meeting of the village trustees.

It was the trustees' application to the OMB last year to incorporate the village which led to the setting up this spring of a joint committee, headed by Dr. Lorne Cumming, special advisor to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and including representatives of King City, and of King Township.

The committee presented a report recommending the setting up of a ward system in the township and the dissolution of police villages. Under this plan the reeve would be elected by the whole

township and 12 councillors elected from eight wards, with areas of over 1,800 population (like King City) electing two councillors.

When the report was received, King City Trustees wrote to Dr. Cumming on April 5 asking that a statement be appended to the report indicating that the committee was not unanimous in approving the proposed new system.

Although the trustees indicated at a public meeting held in the village June 17 to discuss the community's future status that they were opposed to the ward system as "not suitable or practicable in the case of King Township and its villages", they made no official announcement of their intentions.

At their next meeting however, on June 28, a letter was read from their solicitors indicating that an appointment for an OMB hearing on an application for incorporation was being sought.

At the June 17 meeting, which was poorly attended, bulk of the speakers appeared to be opposed to incorporation of the village and several were critical of trustees' handling of village affairs over the years.

The October 12 OMB hearing will be advertised twice in the local press. Local residents will be able to have their views heard at the hearing, provided they give notice of their intention to the OMB.

**Vacational Bible School**  
One thousand and ninety three children, four years and over from the Oak Ridges Lake Wilcox district, attended the Vacation Bible School, at the Brethren in Christ Church, Aubrey Avenue held Monday, Tuesday Wednesday and Thursday evenings of last week. Wednesday drew the biggest attendance with 332 children attending, 200 Monday, 268 Tuesday, and 293 on Thursday. There were eight classes of children with two teachers to each class plus one teenager, and each class followed a project of their own. The youngest ones were drawing pictures, and on Thursday evening the project was making boats of half waxed paper, and the older boys were doing paintings.

Yvick Bachlowa won first prize for bringing the most children and won a camera for taking 35 children, Judy Brennan won a desk globe for taking 25 children.  
The children were picked up and brought back by bus and on the last evening the children from this area, enjoyed hot dogs and pop at Marie's.

## Cost \$30,000 No Decision On Oak Ridges Park

King Township Council at its last meeting discussed further the suggestion that it should contribute \$10,000 to the purchase of an 11-acre site in Oak Ridges for use as a park, but reached no decision on the matter.

Dr. Ross Lord, chairman of the Metro Conservation Authority had suggested earlier in June that council consider assisting the authority in purchasing the site.

Total approximate cost of the land, the C. A. Meadows property, is said to be \$30,000. The authority considers the property unsuitable for residential or industrial purposes. Due to other commitments, however, the authority is not in a position to purchase the land itself and has also had some difficulty in negotiating with the owners.

If King Township accepts the recommendation, the province would be asked to contribute 50% of \$15,000 and a further \$5,000 would be raised by levy over the member municipalities of the authority with King Township exempt for the first year.

## Toronto Woman Faced With Driving Charge

A Toronto woman has been charged with failing to yield the right of way as a result of an accident in King Township, July 16.

Mrs. Gladys Schreiber, 63, was charged after coming out of an intersection at the Third Concession and County Road 11 and colliding with a car driven by James Anderson, 42, of 149 Warren Road, King City.

Mr. Anderson was treated for injuries at York Central Hospital and then released.

## Wilcox Pavilion To Stay Closed

The Sunset Beach Pavilion at Lake Wilcox which was reopened briefly on the weekend following an earlier closure, will now remain closed, Whitechurch Police Chief Fred Mason said this week.

The chief said that the owners had decided that financially it wasn't worth the effort to keep the hall open.

The hall was first closed two weeks ago when about 200 members of a Toronto motorcycle club arrived on the scene, and it was thought best to call off the dancing that night in order to avoid any possible trouble.

Saturday night, after about an hour of dancing word was received that the motorcycleists were back and the hall was closed once again.

Even after it was established that there were only four cyclists and no trouble was anticipated, the dance hall stayed closed and will remain that way.

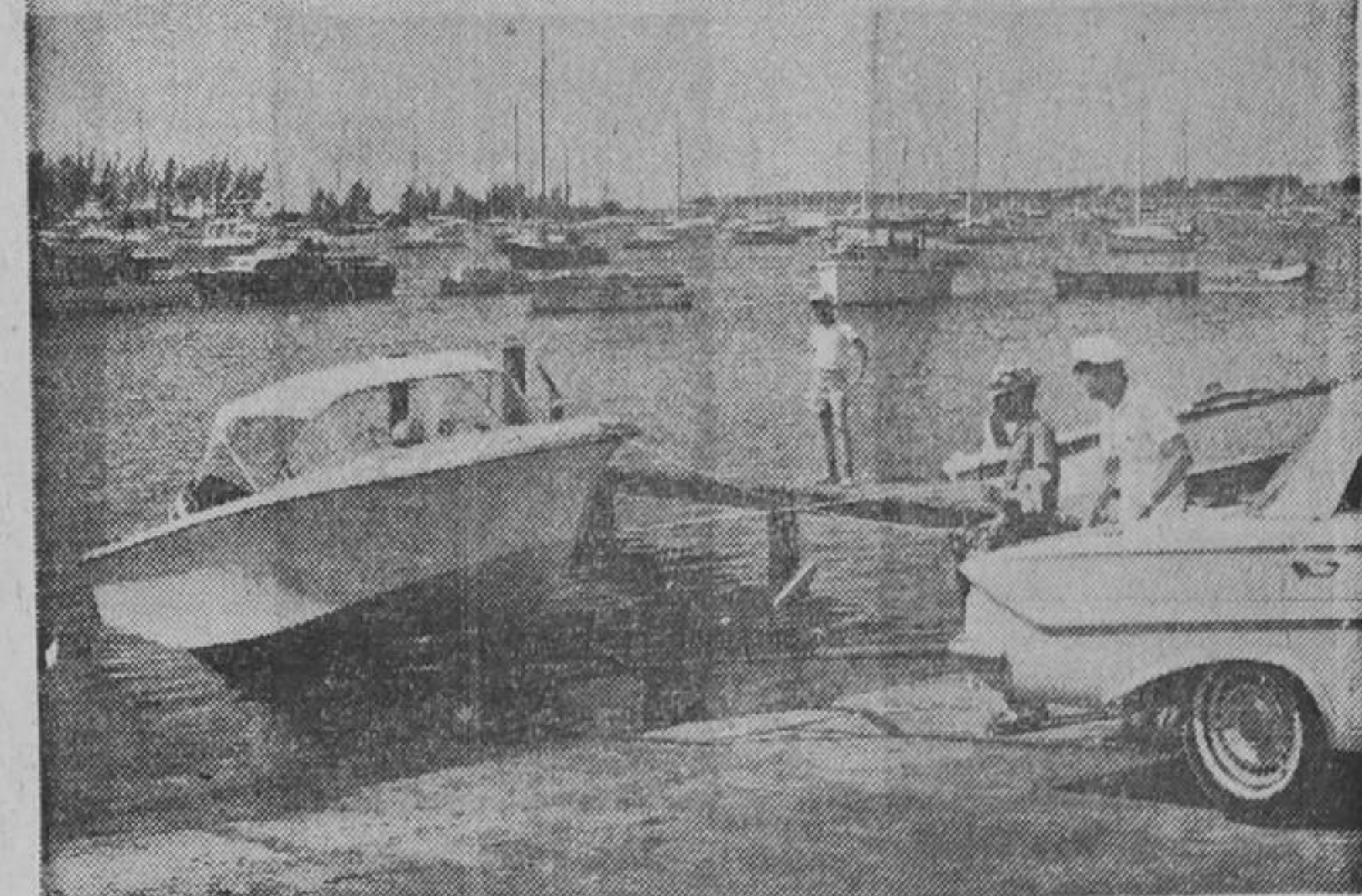

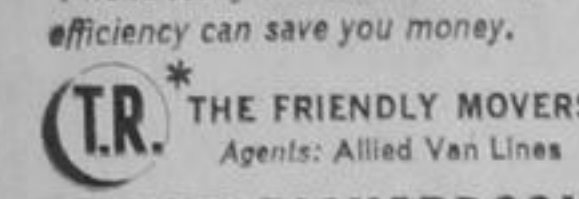
