## New Pool Rules Are Effective At Once

Public Health Act stipulate for the first time the number of guards required at swimming pools and the qualifications they must have. Previously the number of guards had been left up to the good judgment of individual operators. Under the new rules, however, one guard must be provided for each 100 bathers and must have no other duties requiring his absence from the pool deck.

Guards must be at least seventeen years of age and hold either the Royal Life-Saving Society's bronze medal, the YMCA senior lifesaving award, the Canadian Red Cross Society leader safety patrol award or other equivalent certificate.

To discuss the new regulations, operators of the 12 public pools in York County met at the Richmond Hill office of the York County Health Unit July 5.

W. H. Burns, the county's chief sanitary inspector conducted the meeting and explained the health unit's interpretation of the new regulations.

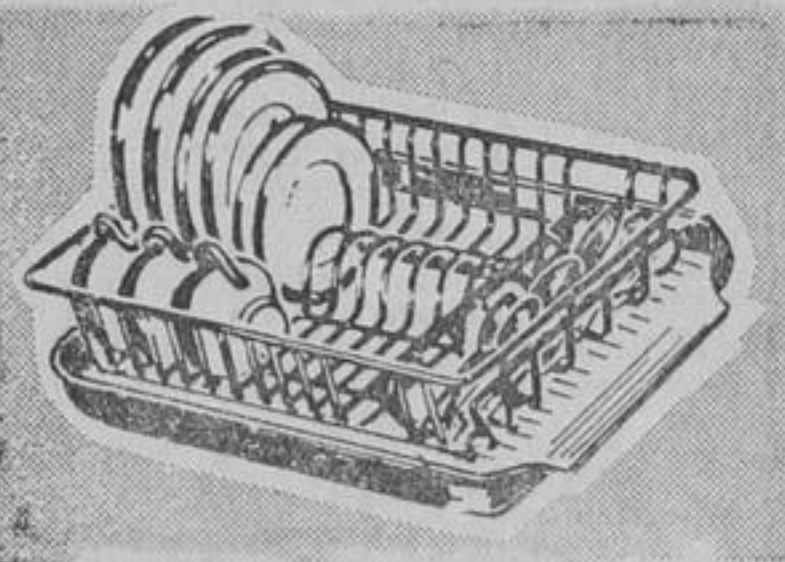

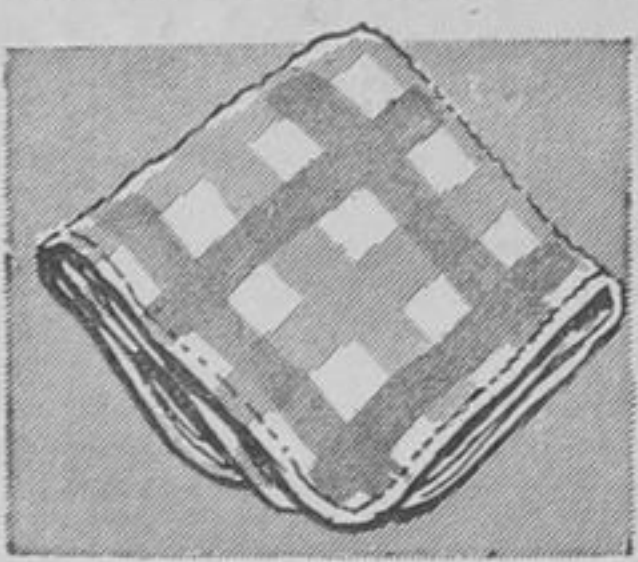

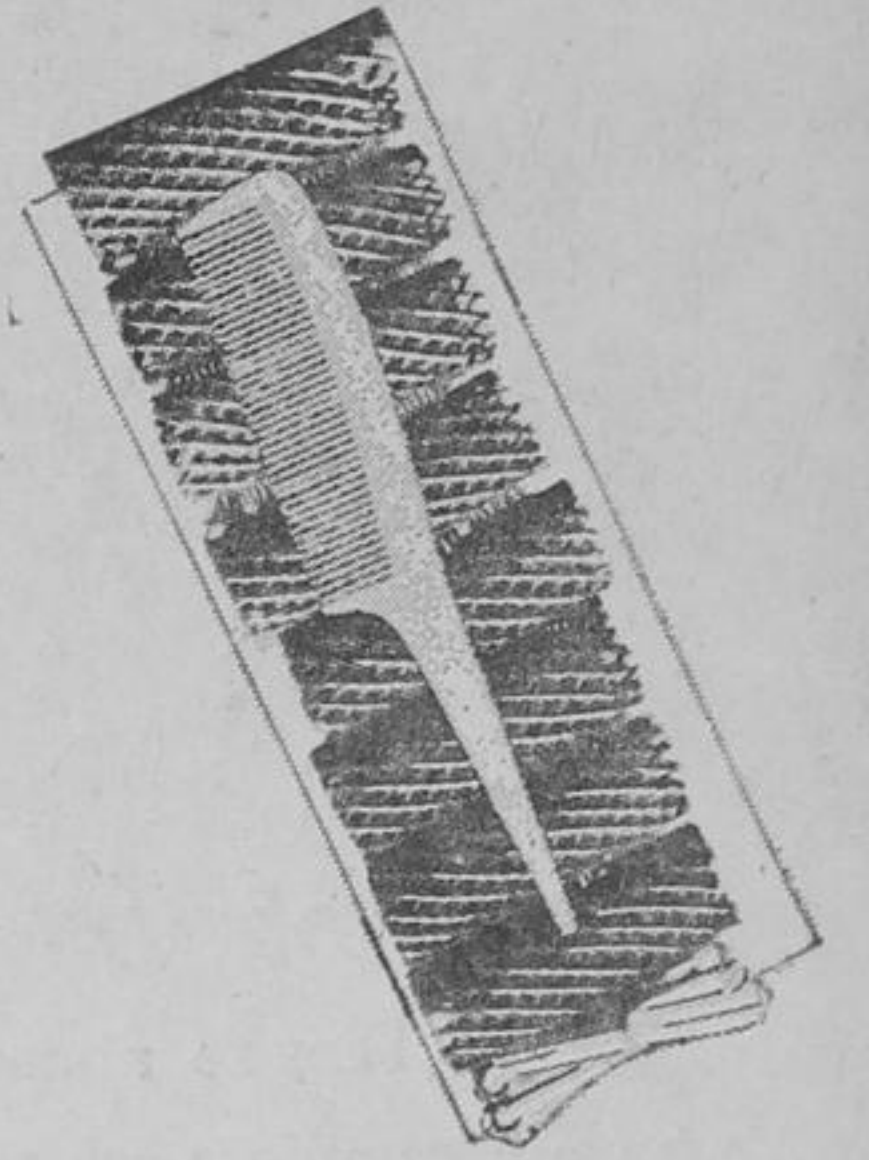

## Public Course Members, Juniors Still Have Chance For Golf Cups

Juniors and public course members will get their chance to get in on some of the trophies that have been awaiting the province's golfers this month with two tournaments the last week in July.

First on the list is the eighth annual Ontario public course amateur championship for the Labatt Trophy at Metropolitan Humber Valley Golf Club, Toronto, July 28.

The event will consist of 18 holes stroke play, with the player returning the lowest gross score for the round, winning the trophy.

The tournament is open to public course players who, since the first of the year have not held privileges of any course from which the general public is excluded at any time.

The juniors will get together for the junior best ball championship of Ontario at the Sum-

mit Golf and Country Club, Oak Ridges, July 30.

The championship is a stroke play competition of 18 holes, played in four ball matches, the better ball of each team to count. The winner will receive the Summit club trophy.

The best ball will be divided into two classes, A — for 16, 17, 18 years, and B — for 15 years and under.

Those in the A class must enter in pairs and have combined handicaps not exceeding 20, while those in the B class must have a combined handicap not exceeding 30.

Entries for the public course championship must be in the office of the Ontario Golf Association, 1173 Bay Street, Toronto, by July 21.

The juniors must have their entries into the OGA by July 20.
