Five-Day Bible Clubs

Across the city this past week, many children were attending Five-Day Bible Clubs for one hour each day, sponsored by the Child Evangelism Fellowship of Ontario.

These clubs met at 272 De-maine, 224 Bayview South, 174 Maple, 296 South Taylor Mills, 153 Trayborn, 204 Mill, 202 Zaida and 42 Leisure.

The Child Evangelism Fellowship is an interdenominational organization. Its program is two fold. In the fall and winter months, Good News Bible Clubs are conducted weekly in homes, after school or in the early evening. In the summer months, the above-mentioned Five-Day Bible Clubs are conducted outdoors in backyards, parks and beaches.

This summer, 46 Bible college students, and other young people have been added to the staff, and are travelling across the province, each conducting four of these outdoor clubs each week. A total of over 30,000 children is expected to be reached.

No other details were available.

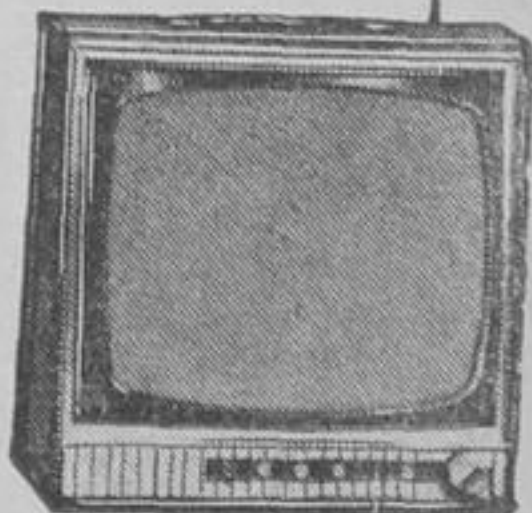
