REMEMBER THE SHORELINE IN SPRING

Anyone who's gonna get serious about catching a largemouth black bass on a flyrod and a popper bug will have to remember a number of items.

He'll want to recall that during the warm months bass feed in the shallows in early mornings and late evenings, and the shoal waters are where he'll want to present his popping bug.

He'll remember that the first few feet of water next to the shore is where the popper bug will feed, and he'll confine his casts to that area; perhaps by donning a pair of hip waders and straddling around the edge of the water.

He'll remember that variety is the spice of life to a bass as well as to an angler, and he'll vary his retrieves as much as possible, first one way and then another, giving free rein to his inventiveness and fishing skill, trying to make that bug look as much like a moth as possible.

And, if he remembers all these things, he'll catch fish. Simple, isn't it?
