## Trip In Comet Car Ends In Jail Term

A youngster's love of Comets landed him in Magistrate's Court this week.

However, it wasn't from any sailing around in outer space. The Comet in question had four wheels and a motor and was just one of three vehicles purloined by David Cairns, 16, of Toronto, to assist him in his travels from Midland to Stouffville, July 28.

"I just had to have it," Cairns was quoted as saying after spotting the 1965 Comet in a garage at Stouffville, where he had driven in two other vehicles he had obtained without taking it up first with the owners.

One of the cars was a convertible, whose canvas roof he had slashed open to gain access.

Prior to taking the cars, Cairns, who was already on probation for car theft, broke into "five or six" cottages in the Midland area, along with some companions, and stole a quantity of food and other articles.

His father, D. Cairns, who testified for the youth, said the cottage incident had been largely due to his son falling into bad company, mainly that of an older youth who had found it easy to influence him.

Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake said Cairns had not been influenced by anybody else when he stole the cars.

"There's something wrong with that boy," said the magistrate. "How are you going to handle a boy like that?"

Mr. Cairns said he felt his son had benefited by the time already spent in custody since his arrest on the charge of car theft last month, and felt that getting him back to school would help to straighten him out.

Magistrate Hollinrake recommended the accused in custody of his father until August 31.

## Late Planted Crops Look Best Throughout County - A. A. Wall

Agricultural Representative A. A. Wall, York County, reports that he has spent a lot of time recently looking at crops throughout the county.

He reports a few general impressions on these visits.

His opinion that barley is a good crop for this county has been strengthened, since the crop looks good this year on a variety of farms.

Many farmers, he states, are liking the looks of their later seeded fields better than those that went in early. Some early seeded fields are shorter and some have second growth coming in which does not make combining easy. It may well be that the dry period hit this year at the wrong time for the early crop and later ones may yield better.

However, cautions Mr. Wall, it's dangerous to judge any crop according to the length of the straw. It's the heads that count and good crops on medium or even short straw are possible, he states.

This shows up best in corn. With early seeding, shorter, lighter stalks and leaves are to be expected. But that doesn't mean these plants will not yield as much or more grain than later sown, taller, heavier plants. This may apply equally well to oats and barley, the ag. rep. states.

He also notes that results from weed spraying are quite obvious, pointing out that oil added to Atrazine has improved control significantly on foxtail and barnyard grass. When weed spray fails, Mr. Wall is suspicious that either the sprayer was not working right or the job was done at the wrong time. A poor spray pattern or clogged nozzles are easy to pick out now.

The best part of the crop story, he reports, is the second hay crop. Good yields are coming off now and will help avoid a hay shortage this winter.

## Abandoned Baby Named Markham

A blonde, blue-eyed baby boy has been named after the Village of Markham.

Daniel Michael Markham, abandoned there in a parked car a month ago, was given his surname in family court Thursday of last week.

His age has been established as one month.

The baby has been cared for since his discovery by town constable Roderick Junkin and his wife, Margaret. They have six children of their own.

But Constable Junkin has since become police chief in Warton and feels the baby should not be taken from the Markham area.

Daniel has been placed in a foster home by the Children's Aid Society.

## Poles, Pulpwood, Logs, Products Of York County's Vivian Forest

Waste sands in Whichurch Township were planted with pine seedlings 30 or 40 years ago, primarily to stabilize the shifting soil and stop erosion by wind and water. But additional benefits are being harvested today in timber production, due to the foresight of these early conservationists.

Red pine stands in Vivian Forest, a York County conservation project, are now being thinned out. This forest is managed by the Department of Lands and Forests. Stems to be removed must be trim and true if they are to be used for poles, and must conform to the rigorous specifications of Domtar Chemicals Limited, the purchaser.

Poles must be so straight that a line joining the centre of the tip with the centre of the pole at a point two feet above the butt shall not deviate more than one inch from the centre line.

To produce a peeled pole with a top diameter of five inches and a length of 16 feet requires a tree seven inches in diameter and 35 feet in height. For a peeled pole seven inch top diameter and 35 feet in length.

They are then loaded on large transports for shipment to Trenton where they are treated with creosote under high pressure and temperature, thus increasing their durability many times. Most of the red pine poles are used in building construction.

Many stems are left for future use as poles, sawlogs and veneer as the work of conservation began nearly half a century ago will provide a timber harvest for years to come.
