 ditch and it is Mr. Jessop's contention that part of the roof water would be absorbed into the surface soil before it reaches the open ditch.

Mr. Jessop's suggestion was referred to the works committee for study.

In reply to questions from councillor Eric Handbury, Works Committee Chairman Floyd Perkins said only informal meetings have been held between the two solicitors and town officials regarding the McCue property. Councillor Handbury, who represents Ward 4, has made it clear he wants to attend any discussions that take place regarding the matter.

Council has approved the expenditure of \$8,500 for the re-planting of both the inside and outside of the water tower on Newkirk Road. The tenders were called by the Ontario Water Resources Commission although the cost will be borne by the municipality. Seven hundred dollars of the contract price will cover the cost of lettering and the Ontario Water Resources Commission crest which will now appear on the tank.

The work will be done by a firm named Boclair, Councillor William Lazenby felt some attempt should have been made to award the contract to a local painter provided he could handle the job.

Council members have informed the Committee of Adjustment that they would like to see certain conditions attached to any splitting of the property on the north side of Markham Road East where two stores have recently been built.

The owner of the property has applied to have the site split for mortgage purposes between the stores and the vacant land to the east. The stores are classed commercial while the vacant land is residential.

Council has requested that a five-foot buffer zone and suitable fencing be erected within 90 days between the two properties. The work is subject to the approval of the works committee.
