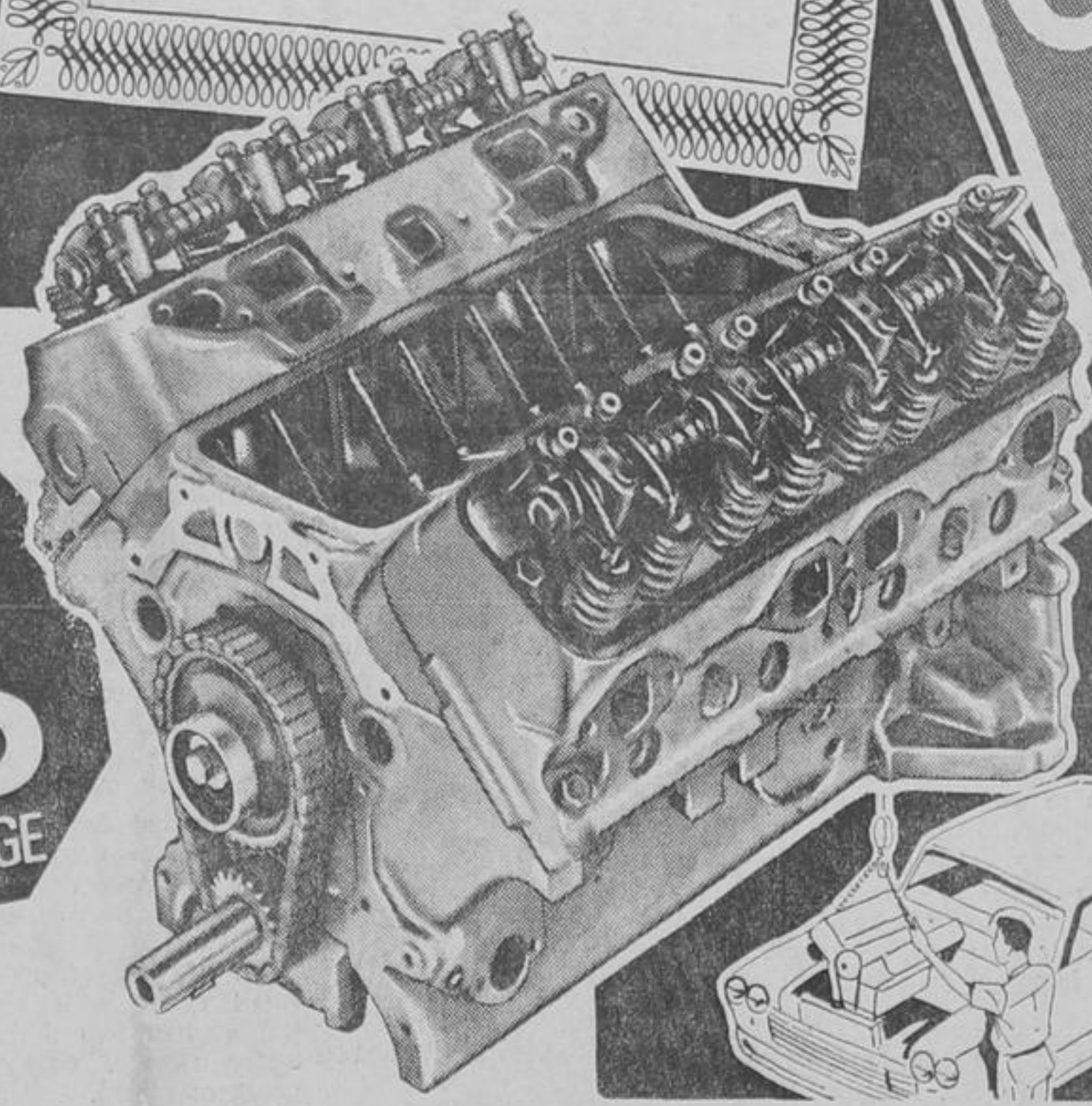

Building In Markham Township Jumps By \$1,000,000 For July

Building in Markham Township for the month of July reached a total of \$1,578,700, up more than \$1,000,000 for the same period last year.

The building report, presented to council last week shows that the construction of three industrial buildings at a cost of \$941,800, constituted the bulk of the revenue, with 24 new single-family detached dwellings, amounting to \$405,000, making up most of the remainder.

Other figures: five additions to dwellings, \$40,000; seven accessory buildings (residential), \$82,600; two commercial buildings, \$84,000; addition to commercial building, \$19,500; sign permit, \$200; two underground fuel tank installations, \$2,300. Building and septic tank permits amounted to \$1,871.

In a report of the engineer, the following recommendations were approved: that an estimate of the cost of paving the lane behind stores on Yonge Street in the Highland Park area, be prepared.

Jail Term Mandatory For Auto Thieves, Warning Of Magistrate

Car thieves, whether out for a joy ride, or taking it for good, can look forward to an automatic jail term in the future.

The warning was issued by Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake last week in Magistrate's Court when he informed James Greeley, 17, of the House of Concord, who was convicted of joy riding, that he would have to send him to prison.

Greeley was arrested by Vaughan Township Police Constable James Mabley, August 7, after he had been involved in an accident near the Langstaff Sideroad.

Constable Mabley said Greeley had taken the car from Sorenson Chrysler Limited, Concord, and after driving it for about half a mile, had hidden it in a bush. He returned

council via the board, summarizing the points to be covered concerning the changeover.

In its brief and accompanying letter to answer questions from the board, council pointed out that it would be responsible for hiring an inspector and would make up any deficit, if receipts from the township were insufficient to meet its share of costs. If the fees were in excess, they would be retained.

The township would also handle the collecting and accounting of fees, and would work out a reciprocal arrangement with the county health unit for a relief inspector, during holidays, sick leave and other such matters.

It was hoped the inspector would be able to be employed full time, assisting with the waterworks and sewer departments when not otherwise engaged.

Pension, hospitalization and workman's compensation schemes would be arranged through the township, with the county prevailing in any matters in which there was a conflict of interest.

Council also agreed with the board that the inspector would work under the supervision and direction of J. Cox, senior plumbing inspector for the county in accordance with the regulations set down by the Ontario Water Resources Commission Act.

Other matters in the report, approved by council, the low quote of Talpark Motors Ltd. of \$2,319 for a two-door, six cylinder automatic police cruiser for the township police department, was accepted over six others.

A radio for the car will be leased from Canadian Electronics at \$20 a month.

The police were also given approval to make a charge of \$3. for accident reports to insurance companies, the money to be placed in general funds of the township.

In the report of the police department, Chief Harvey Cox said the police investigated 30 traffic accidents during July, in which six people were injured.

Stolen property amounted to \$2,349, while \$2,777 of that was recovered. Court revenue amounted to \$2,872.

There were 238 warnings and charges made under the Highway Traffic Act and the Criminal Code.
