The Richmond Hill Hydro-Electric Commission is very pleased to announce, that in keeping with its policy to supply the residents of Richmond Hill with cheap public power and fast experienced service, there will be a general rate reduction for every category of customer effective September 1, 1965.

The new reduced rates which will apply to domestic, commercial and industrial users of electricity, have already been approved by the provincial hydro commission.

The overall rate reduction will amount to 9.2%. This marks the third rate reduction the local commission has granted since its inception in January, 1957.

The new rates shown in the following schedule will be used to calculate the net amount of each bill.
