

### Notice Of Application To The

Ontario Municipal Board by the Corporation of the Township of Vaughan for approval of a bylaw passed pursuant to Section 30 of The Planning Act.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Vaughan intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 30 of The Planning Act for approval of By-law 3127 passed on the 5th day of July 1965. The full text of the by-law is set out below. A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the bylaw and stating the lands affected thereby is set out below.

Any person interested may, within fourteen (14) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Township of Vaughan notice of his objection to approval of the said by-law together with a statement of the grounds of such objection.

The Ontario Municipal Board may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection.

The last date for filing objections will be the 4th day of September, 1965.
