This year's blitz for funds to enable VON to continue to offer these services to the people of Richmond Hill is scheduled for next Monday evening between the hours of 7 and 9. Richmond Hill Branch serves the Town of Richmond Hill, the Township of Vaughan excluding Woodbridge and the Township of Markham excluding the Village of Markham.

A VON nurse is available to everyone in the communities named. The fee is based on the cost of the visit but adjustments can be made and no patient is refused service because of inability to pay. In fact, 61% of the patients are unable to pay the full fee. From June 1964 to June 1965 Richmond Hill VON nurses made 2,913 visits and travelled 14,272 miles.

Markham Township Interested In Council Passes A "Something For Nothing" Offer By-Law To Stop Multiple-Housing

An auto wrecking firm, which moved into Markham Township in the spring and is still awaiting approval to begin its operations, moved a step closer to its objective Monday afternoon when it presented council with a "something for nothing" offer.

The proposal by the firm, Richmond Hill Auto Parts, Don

Mills Road, would give the township a dedication of an 86-foot industrial road at the north-east end of its premises. What the township would have to provide in turn was not stated, although Planning Director Ian Keith said, "The township remains in the driver's seat, notwithstanding the dedication of land."

However, the auto wrecking firm has had an application before council since January asking that the land be rezoned to permit an auto wrecking area, which is known to be opposed by both the Metro Planning Authority and the Ontario Water Resources Committee. Residents of the area also presented a petition protesting the application.

An application by a township resident, Peter Nichols, in August for a permit to operate a scrapyard north of the railroad, was turned over to the township solicitor by council.

The present by-law prohibits wrecking, but not storing. "I think we should grab something for nothing," said Councillor Cleary Palmer. "We will still have control over the use of the land."

Council agreed to put it over for another couple of weeks.

Identify Victim Of Strangulation

The body of a 40-year-old woman found floating in a creek on the grounds of St. Andrew's College, Aurora, last week, has been identified as Mrs. Geraldine Pickford.

Police said Mrs. Pickford had been employed at the school for the past few months as a kitchen helper, and has been missing from her room since Saturday night. However, a search was not organized for her until a woman's purse was found in a school driveway Sunday night.

Her body was found about midnight that evening by L. C. MacPherson, assistant headmaster, and several senior students.

Police said the woman had been strangled and the body may have been carried some distance to the creek. There were no signs of a struggle at the scene. The body has been sent to the Attorney-General's laboratory in Toronto for examination. Both King Township and the CIB of the OPP, investigated the killing.

Mrs. Pickford was separated from her husband.

Rumble Makes A Proposal For The Southern Areas

Dr. Lorne Cumming, who last week advised members of the southern six at their initial meeting to submit any proposals they might have that would be of benefit to all of them, will not have to wait long for one from Markham Township.

The members met last Thursday in Richmond Hill to discuss mutual problems and projects they might have that could be solved collectively. The six members are Woodbridge, Stouffville, Markham Village, Richmond Hill and Markham and Vaughan Townships.

Dr. Cumming, a former Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs, is a special consultant to that department and was called in by the southern six in that capacity.

At the Monday meeting of Markham Township Council, Deputy-revee Stewart Rumble suggested the members make a unified plea for water for the area.

Mr. Rumble said his idea would call for an "immense watermain", running from Lake Ontario to Highway 27, across 19th Avenue and down Highway 48.

"If we can get water up, we can get sewage back down", Mr. Rumble said. Council will discuss the matter at the next committee meeting.

NORTH YORK TOWNSHIP: Council has approved a \$25,000 grant to assist the Hummer Memorial Hospital Mental Health Clinic. Plans are to expand psychiatric service to the public and perfect the hospital's pioneer mental health clinic.

(Continued from Page 1) change had been well publicized in "The Liberal" and wondered why residents objecting hadn't asked for an audience earlier.

Councillor Eric Handbury who represents Ward 4 said there had been 14 objections received to the proposal resulting from a questionnaire which had been circulated.

"These people," he said, "were opposed to just single-family residences. They asked for duplexes to be included and believed that they would be. It wasn't until recently they found out differently."

It was in the spring that planning board received a delegation of ratepayers who presented 74 individual petitions signed by property owners asking for more restricted zoning.

Mr. Reygraft commented there had been some objections and was unhappy that planning board hadn't called a special meeting to consider the complaints.

Mayor Thomas Broadhurst felt it would have been up to planning board to call a meeting but had apparently decided against it because of the "solid demonstration that most of the people favoured the change."

He said there would still be opportunity for dissenters when the by-law is presented before the OMB. "It'll be advertised at that time and if there are objections the municipal board could hold public or private meetings."

Mr. Reygraft said it was his opinion the hearing should have been at the planning board level.

Reeve Plaxton added his support to the by-law but stated there should "have been a public hearing if objections had been received."

The by-law was passed unanimously.

NORTH YORK TOWNSHIP: School Trustee Sybil Darnell complained to the board of education that children are having to walk more than a mile to Cresthaven Public School because accesses across Ontario Hydro lands have not been constructed as promised. She charged some youngsters are being made to walk 14 blocks instead of four.

NEWMARKET: Ernest Stefanuk, owner of a new ticket office and travel agency on Main Street, charged Mayor Bert Kent had overstepped his authority in postponing the Gray Coach Lines to complain about lack of washroom facilities in the building. Mr. Stefanuk reported these facilities will be included in the agency on completion.

(Continued from Page 1) ing upkeep of property through its site plan agreement when it discusses the situation further with the two firms concerned.

Mr. Simmons also entered a complaint about another business, stating the "area north of Lot 2 and east of Lot 3 is still littered with car bodies and other junk and this spring, crank case oil from those cars flowed on to my property disfiguring the lawn and damaging shrubs. Further, car parts have been found on my land."

He said that another source of continued annoyance resulted from garbage being stacked daily in the laneway back of stores fronting on Levedale Road.

"The matter of car bodies was presented to council in October 1960, and the matter of garbage in 1964 to planning board. It does not appear any action has been taken."

Reeve Plaxton said it might be advisable to write to the garage owners concerned advising them of the conditions in the expectation they would be remedied.

Mayor Thomas Broadhurst said an effective law against such a problem doesn't exist. "We don't have a lot of power to act," he said.

Mr. Simmons said the business could be classified as a junk yard under the zoning by-law which would provide council with the necessary corrective authority.

Councillor Walter Scudds said the firm had a car dealership and was not classified as a junk car-wrecking yard.

Council decided to hand the problem over to its by-law enforcement officer as well as the police and fire committee for study.

"It might well constitute a fire hazard", said Councillor Lois Hancey.
