After undergoing treatment at a Toronto Hospital for 15 months, Roscoe Casement of 74 Mill Street, Richmond Hill, passed away on September 12, in his 76th year.

A resident of Richmond Hill for the past 35 years, Mr. Casement was born at Wooler, Ontario, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Casement, and lived for a time in Lindsay before coming to this community.

During his residence here, Mr. Casement was employed by the town in the roads department, with the exception of the years during World War II when he worked at ship-building in Toronto. After his retirement from the roads department at the end of 1963 he served as school crossing guard at the corner of Yonge Street and Lorne Avenue, where he took a close interest in his many young charges.

An ardent bowler, Mr. Casement was a member of Richmond Hill Lawn Bowling Club and of five-pin bowling leagues in the community. He is survived by sons Robert O. Richmond Hill, Clifford of Islington and daughter Phyllis (Mrs. B. R. Lee) of Weston; and one brother, Orville of Oshawa. His wife, the former Margaret Morrison, predeceased him in 1952.
