**Before The Magistrate**  
**Convict Keswick Man**  
**Of Indecent Assault**

A 22-year-old father of three pleaded guilty to a charge of indecently assaulting a 43-year-old grandmother and was remanded for sentence until October 7 when he was convicted last week in Magistrate's Court.  
 Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake said he would like a pre-sentence report on Giuseppe Bitondo, of RR 1, Keswick, before sentencing him.  
 Police Constable Robert Smallbone of Vaughan Township, testified that the accused had given the complainant, a Thornhill woman, a ride in his car September 9, after he had noticed her waiting for a bus near the Orange Home. Although the woman told him she was going to Thornhill, Bitondo turned off at Vaughan Road and proceeded to molest his passenger, the constable said.  
 The woman became scared and grabbed the wheel of the car, causing it to go into the ditch.  
 In her testimony, the woman said Bitondo only let her out of the car after making her promise she wouldn't tell the police. However, she took the licence number of the car when she got out. She said at that time he seemed more concerned about the condition of his automobile than her welfare.  
 Bitondo was remanded in custody.
