Committee Wants Youth Counsellor In Richmond Hill

A professional youth counsellor is one of the answers offered to deal effectively with Richmond Hill's problem of vandalism.

The committee, via a letter signed by its secretary, Mrs. M. Stephenson, expressed opposition to the present methods of bringing children into the police courts or the cells. It feels that "besides doing nothing for the erring ones in the right directions it could do much in the wrong."

"This committee", the letter continues, "is in accord with the suggestion that instead of adding to the police force the town employ a full-time professional youth counsellor to whom those apprehended could be sent before being charged."

The counsellor would talk with the children, contact the parents and guardians and take steps to cure the situation at its roots.

"All minor infractions of gentlemanly and ladylike behavior in public could be dealt with in this way and thus prevent further infractions of a criminal nature to develop."

The counsellor's services could also be of inestimable value in blending the work of the existing social and welfare agencies thus eliminating the present overlapping in the work."

Council turned the matter over to its police committee for further study.
