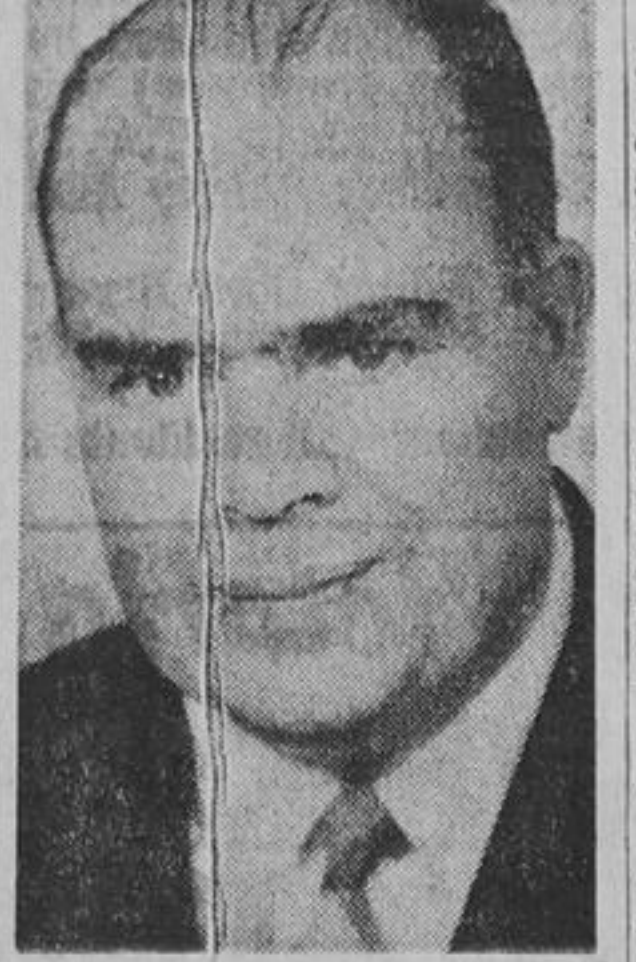

## Lease Town Property Bank Of Nova Scotia

An agreement to lease town-owned property on Lorne Avenue near Yonge to the Bank of Nova Scotia for a five-year period for parking purposes has received the blessings of the town's works committee. Town council had earlier announced its acceptance subject to the feelings of the works committee. That cost of all grading, paving or other works shall be at the expense of the bank; that it shall maintain the property at all times in a proper manner at its expense. Terms of the lease be for a five year period with the town having the option of cancellation subject to a six months notice with its right of automatic renewal; and no compensation to lessee on notice to vacate. A town by-law requires the extra parking space when the bank's proposed addition is built on the eastern side of the present structure. In other business council approved the paying of the following accounts: General account \$122,489.24; road account \$855.35; and water account \$11,481.72. The amounts are for the months of August and September. The road account was for the month of September. Received approval from the Minister of Highways for a further grant of \$21,500 for road maintenance. An original request for \$199,260.75 for supplementary road expenditures was approved in part.

The Richmond Hill Naturalists held the first of their fall indoor meetings on September 17. John Pyatt, one of the student members presented slides and a commentary on scenes from Algonquin Park where he worked for the summer. John sighted a long-tailed jaeger at the park. Normally it summers in the Arctic. Mrs. Jean Seddon gave a short talk about some of the problems facing the Great Lakes Institute in their research work, such as the lowering water levels and consequent difficulties. Some of the members' slides were shown covering both birds and plants. To top off an enthusiastic evening the members were invited to the Campbell home for coffee. Field trips are important to a natural history club and certainly the following Sunday's trip to the southern research station was an excellent beginning. Neither the very humid weather nor a sudden downpour of rain dampened the spirits of the thirty people present. Rod Standfield, supervisor of wildlife research, outlined the various projects being conducted in Ontario, ranging from the woodland caribou in the far north to a muskrat project on Lake Erie. A good deal of wildlife work is centred around the research laboratory in Algonquin Park and it is here that the study on wolves was initiated. Mr. Standfield showed samples of the special electronic collars developed for caribou, wolves and foxes and reported that the battery life in the collars endured for about

## Officials Attend Good Roads Meet

Three weeks ago a dog belonging to Frank Boland of Stoffville was attacked by a fox. Later the fox also had a skirmish with a neighbor's dog. The neighbor shot the fox, but the wounded animal took refuge in a stable where it was trampled to death by a horse. Since no human being was involved, the fox's brain was not sent for pathological examination, but a veterinarian advised typing up the involved domestic animals for a month. Last week Mr. Boland noticed his dog was not eating and took him to the veterinarians where he was placed under observation. The next morning the dog was dead without having exhibited any symptoms of illness. This week, a report from the federal pathological laboratories in Hull, on the dog's brain tissue, was positive rabies. Canine Control Officer James Ryan calls this indication that rabies is still prevalent in this area to the attention of the public, warning parents particularly to caution children about handling stray animals.
