

Police Accident Report

A 19-year-old Cooksville youth was killed instantly when he lost control of his car and smashed into the rear of a truck on Highway 400, two miles north of Highway 7, September 25 about 2:25 am.

Police said Donald Michael MacDougall, Burnhamthorpe Road West, was decapitated in the accident.

His car was believed to have left the highway and crossed over to the other side of the road where the truck was parked on the west shoulder.

Constable Ian Robertson, Bond Lake OPP, is investigating.

Two other people are in satisfactory condition in York Central Hospital, where they were taken following an accident in Markham Township September 24.

Police said Mrs. Jean Harper, RR 1, Unionville, and Robert Reid, Stouffville, both suffered head injuries when their cars were in collision on Concession 6 at 17th Avenue.

Damage to the two cars was estimated at \$1,400.

In an accident at Kennedy Road and Steeles Avenue, September 26, about \$115 damage was done to cars driven by William Fulker and Henry Gazard, both of Toronto.

Police said the Fulker

vehicle was turning into a service station when it was allegedly struck from behind by the other vehicle.

Vaughan Township Police reported three accidents, two of which landed the drivers in the ditch.

Russell Bobbette, 32, of Toronto, told police he fell asleep while driving on Elgin Mills Road West and drove into a ditch. The car hit a culvert and was damaged to the extent of \$250.

Bobbette received some cuts on the nose.

Alex Simpson, 34, of Weston, who also drove into a ditch and struck a hydro pole, told police he had stepped on the gas pedal instead of the brake and had lost control of the car.

The accident occurred September 26 at Dufferin Street, just north of Highway 7, and caused about \$550 damage to the car.

Murray York, 25, of 40 Railway Street, Maple, told police he had "glanced away" while turning into the Cadillac Lumber Yard in Maple, September 25, and had struck a parked car.

The car belonged to William Gled, Church Street, Maple. Damage to the two vehicles was \$300.
