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Before The Magistrate

Three Charged With Vaughan Still

Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake granted reduced bail to three Vaughan Township residents when they appeared last week in Magistrate's Court on a charge of possessing a still.

Released for trial in November were Vittorio Viececi, \$2,000 property; Alysae Linkenheld, his own bail of \$1,000; and Frank Mariano, \$1,000 cash.

RCMP Prosecutor George Miller had asked that bail be set at \$1,000 cash for each of the three accused, after holding them on \$5,000 bail since their arrest Sunday night.

However, after hearing that Viececi had a \$3,000 equity in a farm in the township, and that Linkenheld lived with him, Magistrate Hollinrake asked Mr. Miller why they should not be given bail on that basis.

"This is a very serious charge, your worship," said Mr. Miller. "Every charge is serious."

Mr. Hollinrake replied, "The men were arrested by RCMP after a raid on a township farm, in which 1,000 gallons of mash and four gallons of alcohol were seized."

After hearing the evidence in another case, Magistrate Hollinrake adjourned the hearing against Giuseppe Masarella of Toronto until October 21, with the suggestion that he get a lawyer to advise him.

"It's quite possible you may not be guilty," Mr. Hollinrake told Masarella, who had pleaded guilty to a charge of dangerous driving. Then speaking to Crown Attorney Arleigh Armstrong, he said: "From the evidence you've put before me, there's no case."

Mrs. Hazel Burbidge, of RR 1 Maple, told the court that she had been driving east on the Maple Sideroad, August 12, when Masarella, coming in the opposite direction in a dump truck, had crossed over the road and hit the rear of her car, sending it into a guard rail.

She said there hadn't been any objects on the road to cause the accused to swerve, but thought he had fallen asleep.

Police Constable Brian Oakley, Vaughan Township, who investigated the accident, said he

could not find any obvious reason for it either. The accused was sober, he said.

Lively Exhibit By York County In Progress For Plowing Match

York County's exhibit at the International Plowing Match to be held at Milliken October 13 to 16 is shaping up nicely under the supervision of Alex Davidson, assisted by Jim Darlington, Stewart Diceman and Ken Higgs.

The livestock section will be top notch with representatives of every breed including Brown Swiss and Santa Gertrudis. Steers, a sow and litter, pony with foal, lambs and even a dog with a litter of pups will also be included.

The historical section promises to be a lively one with five blacksmiths lined up to keep a fully equipped blacksmith's shop in operation throughout the show, buttermaking with several milkmaids on hand to

hand milk the cows and put the milk through a separator on the spot. Churning will be done by dog power.

Chair caning is another live display and everyone involved will be in appropriate costume.

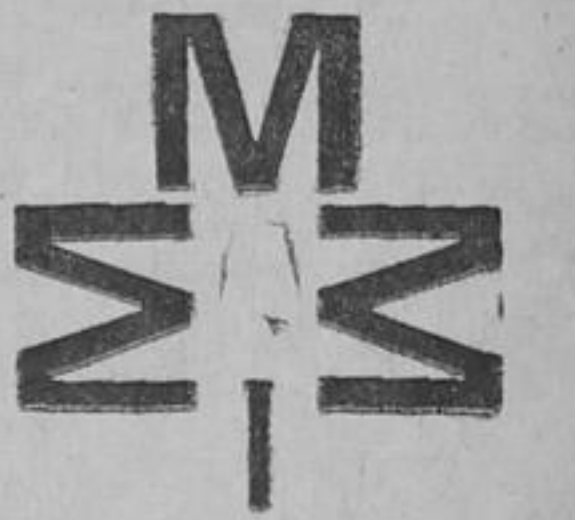
The third division will be in a very large tent and will include exhibits depicting the activities of farm organizations in York County - Junior Farmers, WI, 4-H Clubs, Federation of Agriculture, Wheat Producers, Holland Marsh Vegetable Growers, Farm Safety Council, Horticultural Societies and Co-op Medical Association. There will even be a display by the CN, whose marshalling yard in Vaughan Township is considered by the committee to be a York County organization.



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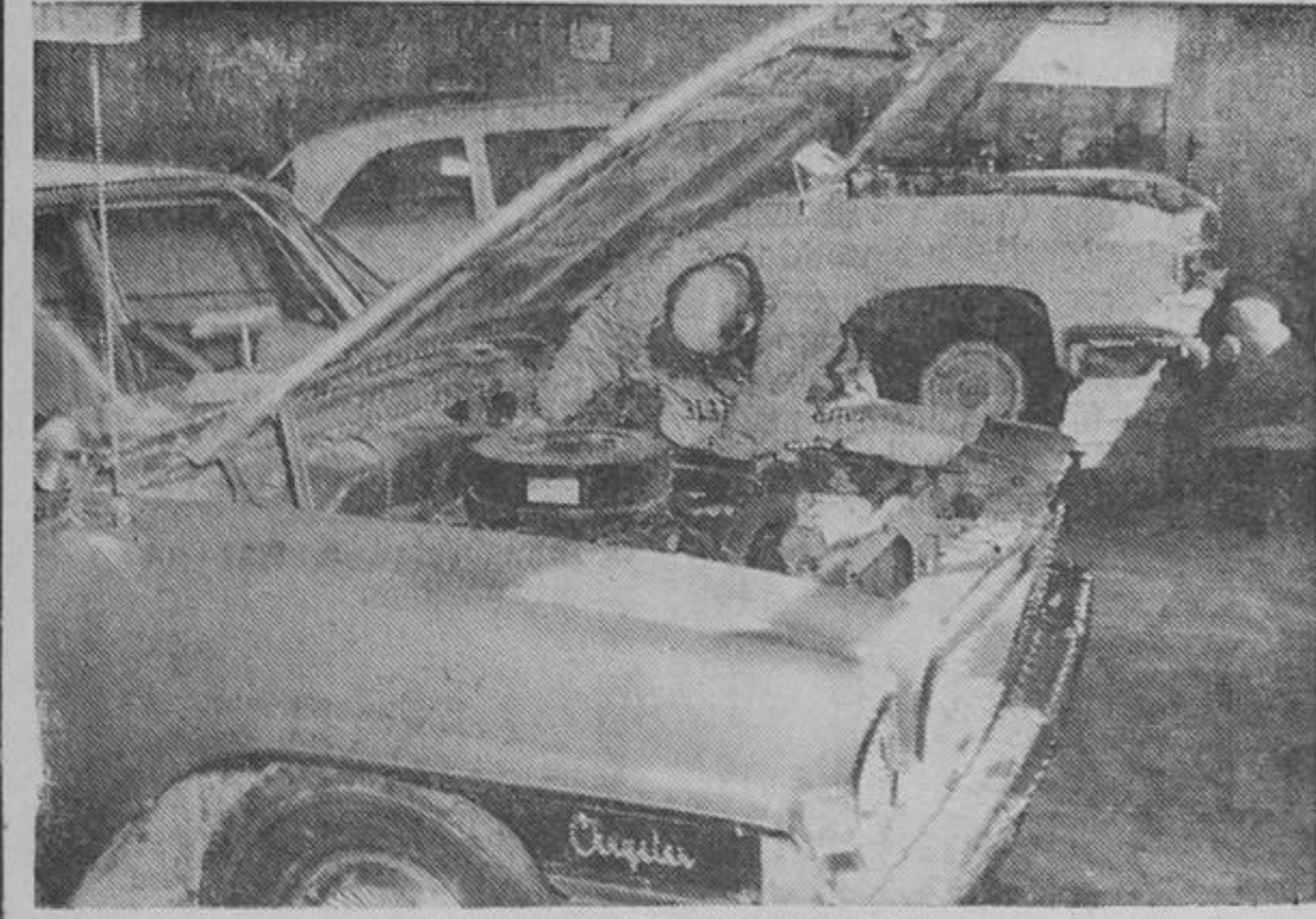
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
