**Addison Wants Greater Challenge For Company Of Young Canadians**

In a non-political speech to the Aurora Board of Trade, this week, John Addison called for expansion of the concept of the Company of Young Canadians. For the company to be truly effective, it should offer youth much more than just participation in a program for missionary-style aid to underdeveloped areas, he said.

Mr. Addison is the Liberal candidate for York North and was elected to the House of Commons in 1962 and 1963.

In his speech, devoted entirely to an appraisal of the international role to be played by the Company of Young Canadians, he said: "There is no reason why, after serving their term, that these Canadian volunteers should not remain in the various countries to enter the business community as full-fledged business partners for the improvement of that country's industrial progress. This is a challenge that our youth will embrace."

tural specialists, or advisors. But how much more far-reaching would their contribution be if they stayed on as Canadian entrepreneurs in partnership with the local citizens? In countries like Thailand, Hong Kong and Lebanon, which I visited in 1964, an idea for industrial development is far more important than money.

"I am not suggesting for one moment that our young people leave Canada to find greater business opportunities because I, for one, think that the opportunities in this country are unmatched. But there are those who enjoy exploring the unknown and these are the very people that can contribute so much to Canada's progress."

"Most young people I know put a high premium on independence of thought and action. They seem to sense there can be a new type of frontiersman in a world of hydrogen bombs and exploitation of outer space. They can be rallied only by clear ideals and opportunity, not a set of reservations. It is necessary for all governments to realize this fact and put stock in the potential of our youth, for our future depends on the young."

**Two Subdivisions Pleasantville Area**

Describing two subdivision proposals as premature, Richmond Hill Planning Board will seek the advice of their consultant, Max Bacon, before considering them further.

At its Tuesday night meeting, the board received a letter from Section Developments Limited, signed by John Griffin, asking for an opinion as to the possibility of proceeding with the development of 38.29 acres of land on the north side of Mill Street adjoining Pleasantville.

The proposal is for approximately 40 lots of about a half acre each for a luxury, architecturally controlled subdivision. It also provides for creation of a nine-hole, par-three golf course adjoining the present golf club. As many housing lots as possible will have the rear yard facing the golf course.

Since this land is now in Vaughan Township, Mr. Griffin suggested it be annexed to the town. "While

we know sewage facilities are limited, we feel that a subdivision of this type will be an asset to the town and should be considered at this time. The proximity of sewer and water lines make it an ideal property to develop," Mr. Griffin wrote.

The other proposal was submitted to Mr. Bacon by Pleasantville Developments Ltd. for land on the south side of Mill Street, adjacent to Pleasantville, also in the Township of Vaughan. Mr. Bacon had forwarded a copy of this proposal which includes high-rise apartment houses on Bathurst Street, to the board.

Chairman Howard Whilans noted that town council had adopted a policy that new subdivisions would not be encouraged until the town's new official plan, which is being prepared at the present time, has been adopted, and it is possible to ascertain if such subdivisions will fit into the overall planning.
