Meanwhile, in spite of chilly weather, the field hockey team continues to practice for a game against Woodbridge next week.

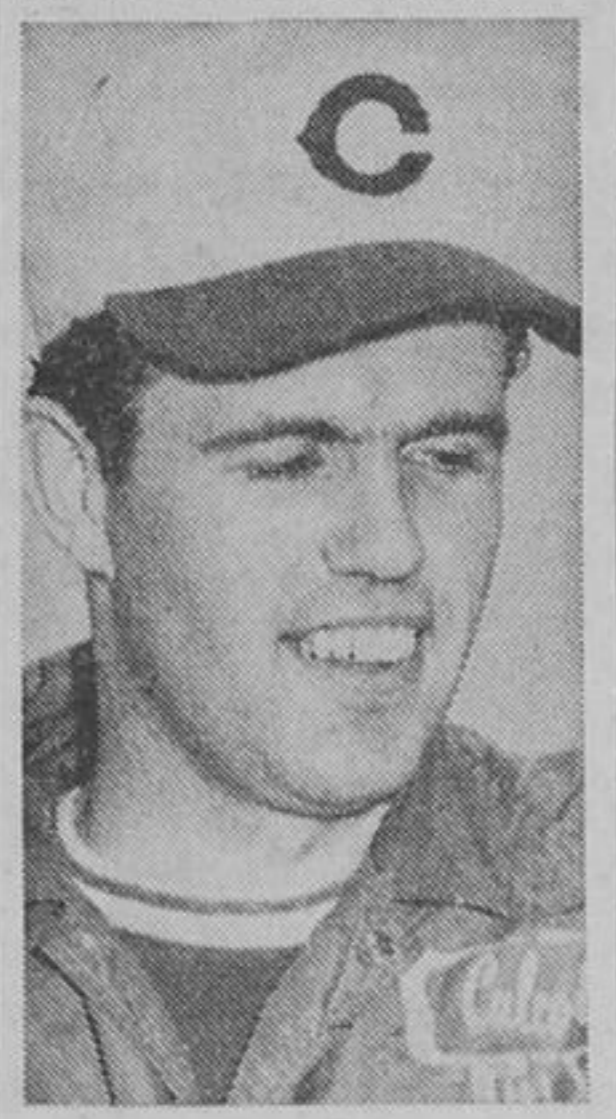
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
