The Stingrays lost the first game of the playoffs 2-1 to their northern neighbors but came back to take game two by the score of 5-1. In the three games East Gwillimbury had only four runners cross the plate, while the local 10-year-olds managed to

Doug Webster wielded the big bat for the local lads in the final game, coming up with two home runs, a triple and a walk for a perfect day at the plate. He scored three runs and drove in six, besides sharing pitching duties with Val Steffan. Greg Binkley and Robbie Edwards each collected three hits.

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
