45% Hong Kong Population Now Under 15, Edna Izzard Reports

"If you want to see evidence of the population explosion - go to Hong Kong!" This was the advice of Miss Edna Izzard, who addressed the September meeting of York County University Women's Club at Kingcraft.

Miss Izzard reported on the theme of the Conference of the International Federation of University Women, which she attended with Miss Frances Hurst at Queensland University in Brisbane, Australia.

"The Impact of Population, Social and Educational Implications," was the conference theme. In the oriental tour which Miss Izzard enjoyed before the conference, she saw evidence of the population explosion, especially in Hong Kong, where 45% of the population is aged 15 years and under.

In that age group, unfortunately, 65% of the world's population is in the underdeveloped countries, where state-supported birth control programs have, mostly failed because of the primitive living conditions of the people.

Miss Izzard reported on the beautiful Queensland University, where 35 countries were represented. Honduras, Iran, Kenya and Nigeria were new members.

During their eastern tour Miss Izzard and Miss Hurst found themselves in Singapore on the day it seceded from the Malaysian Federation. The speakers were introduced by Mrs. James Langstaff and thanked by Mrs. John Heard.

Mrs. T. B. MacPherson reported for the group on the Canadian Federation of Universities Women's Council meeting at Laurentian University in Sudbury in June.

Mrs. Langstaff announced that W. R. Rhoda, director of provincial library services, will address the October meeting and will discuss the library services available in this area.
