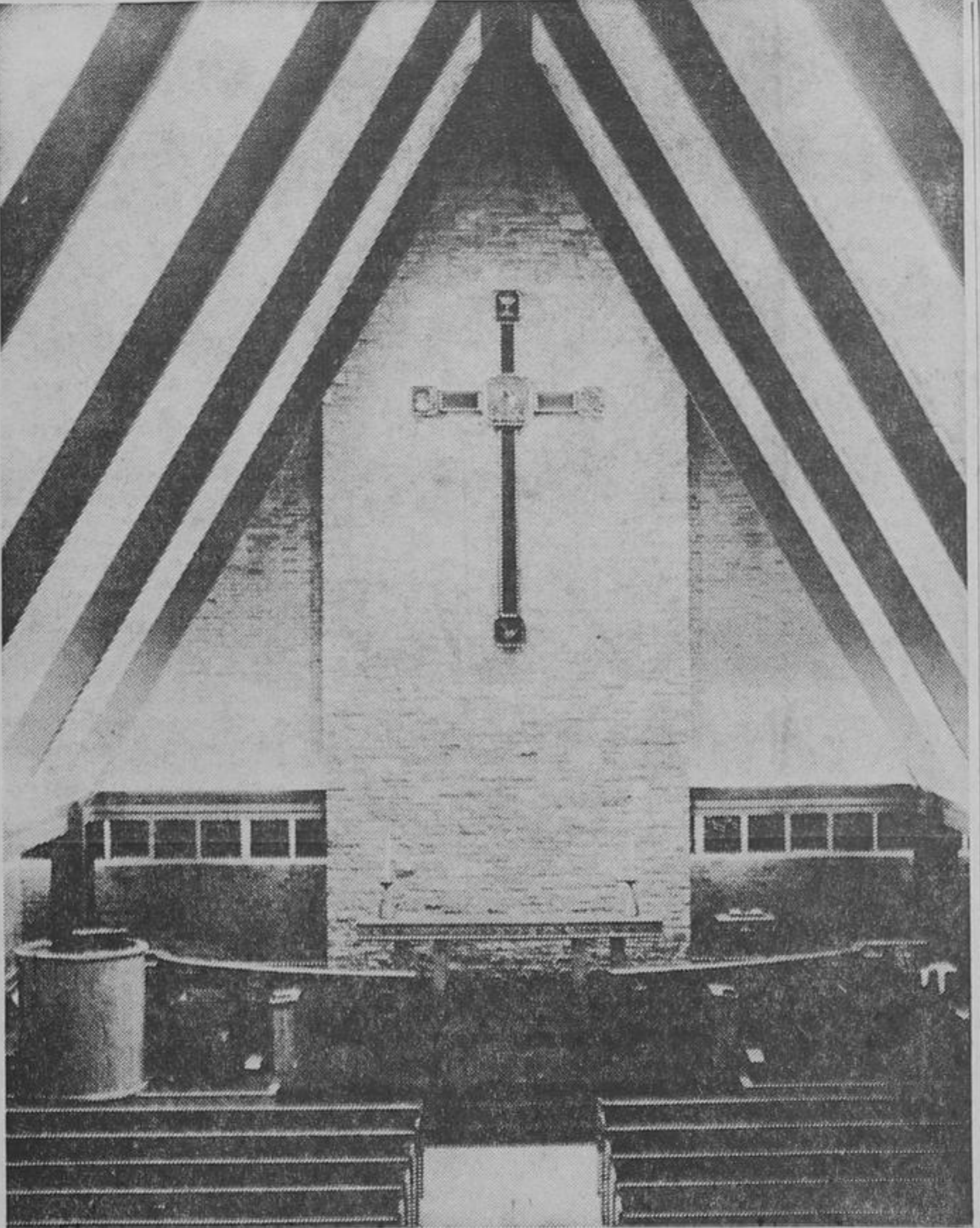

SUPERB BLENDING OF ARCHITECTURE, REVERENCE AND SIMPLICITY

1st Anniversary New St. Mary's

The first anniversary service in the new St. Mary's Anglican Church, Richmond Hill, will be held on Sunday in the form of a Dedication Festival. This will mark the congregation's rededication to its new church and offer opportunity for further service to its members.

The first sod for this beautiful new edifice which occupies a commanding site on Yonge Street was turned on Ash Wednesday last year. The new church was dedicated by the Right Rev. F. H. Wilkinson, Bishop of Toronto on October 26, 1964.

The beauty and purity of line of the new stone church has been highly praised as one of the finest in Canada, successfully blending the new with the old.

Tangible expression of the feeling of deep pride felt by the congregation of St. Mary's in their beautiful new church has been evidenced by the numerous furnishings donated. Virtually all major items including the Cross, Holy Table, Communion, nave pews and kneelers have been donated by parishioners.

On Sunday Canon Lewis Garnsworthy, rector of historic St. John's, York Mills, will be special preacher at the 10:30 morning service. Rev. John Paterson-Smyth, rector of St. Cyprian's, Toronto, will be guest preacher at the evening service at 7 pm.

The advisory board of St. Mary's has decided the whole congregation should be visited, since it is two years since the last visitation. Rev. J. F. O'Neill, rector of the parish for almost nine years, will outline a parish visitation in the interests of the continuing financial needs of the church.

In the last 15 years, the local congregation has grown tremendously, both in size and activities. There are now 650 families on the church rolls, and it is estimated 150 Anglican families have moved into this community since the last visitation two years ago.

The rector is ably assisted by Rev. Donald Bone and lay readers Winslow Case, Donald Little and Harry Hill. Church wardens are A. W. G. Farwell, W. D. Ross and H. Stanford.

The old church, built in 1872, has been preserved as a chapel, linking the present congregation with its history which dates back to 1830. The church is a good example of early English architecture and in its small way follows the design of St. James' Cathedral, Toronto.

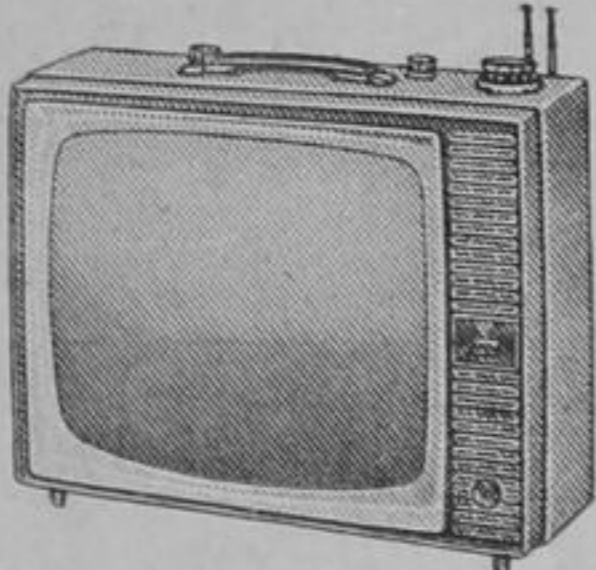

At Crosby Heights

Revised Bid Results In Contract

Bankfield Construction Ltd., Toronto, was awarded the contract for the new addition and alterations at Crosby Heights School at a special meeting of Richmond Hill Public School Board October 12.

The meeting was called to consider the revised tenders for the school, after the board refused any of the tenders submitted the week before.

Bankfield's winning tender totalled \$418,965, down

\$17,235 from the original estimate. The new tenders were based on revisions suggested by the architect, K. Bindhardt of Bindhardt and Cheney, after meeting with the board.

The only other tender to be submitted was from Carruthers Construction in the amount of \$428,016. A. Weller Co. Ltd., which submitted the low tender the first time around, declined to submit a second one.

Architect's fee for the total work is \$26,029, while furniture and equipment amount to \$49,280, and the one per cent contingency fund is \$4,942.

School Wing Cost Jumps \$120,000

(Continued from Page 1) ing earlier in the week had agreed the \$120,000 was a large increase but said it was due to the high cost of getting a contractor.

There had been no tenders received when the board first applied for them and invitations had to be sent out instead.

Three tenders were received which were even higher than the \$120,000 increase. The board then decided to ask for revised tenders with some deletions from the original plans to bring the amount down to \$120,000. Accepted contractor was Bankfield Construction Ltd., of Weston.

The letter to council broke down the \$499,217 cost in the following way: Contractor \$418,965; architect's fee \$26,029.90; furniture and equipment \$49,280; and contingency one per cent, \$4,942.10.

It asked that the town council seek final approval from Markham and Vaughan and the municipal board. Richmond Hill is responsible for 97 per cent of the debenture with the remaining three percent divided between the two other municipalities.

This year Crosby Heights is accommodating grade 7 pupils from Walter Scott, while grade eight pupils remain at the latter. Next year, however, all grade seven and eight students east of the CNR will be accommodated at the senior school on Crosby Avenue.

Business Administrator Kenneth Turton said work was going "very slowly" at Walter Scott. The roof was not up yet and the contractor had told him they were still awaiting the bricklayers.

Total cost of the project was \$36,336, of which \$12,800 had been completed to date. The 15 per cent holdback and previous payments left a progress payment of \$6,927 to the company.

Winston Construction received a progress payment of \$5,551 toward the total cost of \$46,569.

Mr. Turton said that the brick and steelwork were up and roofing would be started on the weekend. Window frames were to be installed Monday.

Total completed to date was \$9,403.

Richvale, Maple, Kleinburg

High Enrolment Forces Changes In Vaughan Township Public Schools

Because of unexpected high enrolment in the senior grades efforts are being continued to find a suitable qualified teacher to assist in the grade 1 class at Kleinburg.

Another change has been made necessary because of exceptionally heavy enrolments in the combined classes of grade 5 and 6 pupils in both the George Bailey and Gibson Schools in Maple. All grade 5 pupils from the two schools are now being accommodated at the Bailey School and all grade 6 pupils at the Gibson School. All parents were notified of this decision on September 17 and the pupils were transferred September 21. This move reduced the teaching load of the two teachers to a more reasonable work half-time with the grade 2 level.
