Water Shortage At Kettleby School

The only thing worse than a well with no water is one that just hasn't got enough.

Just ask the teachers and pupils of Kettleby Public School.

King Township Public School Board member Wilbert Jennings said that the water problem commenced with the new addition of the school in 1964 which resulted in an increase of 137 school children some from the Armitage School on Yonge which was closed down.

"Our present student population is 475," he said, "and the one well just won't carry the load. The well, he continued, usually sputters out about halfway through the afternoon "just when it is required the most." Affected mainly by the lack

of water are the washroom facilities.

Mr. Jennings said that a second well was dug but it produced no water.

"It's causing a great deal of concern and we haven't quite decided what is the best thing to do."

Mr. Jennings said some thought has been given to tanking in water to make up the difference.

"Our present well has just been cleaned and pumped out but we're still shy of water although what we get is very clean."

Next step might be to build another well but the board is now considering the calling in of a water diver in preparation for building another well — with water, it's hoped.

Will Announce Location Halloween Party, Dance

A Halloween party will be held October 30 at 8 pm for the small fry in Lake Wilcox under 12 years, followed by a dance

at 9 pm for those between 12 and 21. Donations of candy, gum and shellouts will be collected from homes by committee members to be given out to the children as they leave. The program will include apple-bobbing and other traditional Halloween games and a parade of costumes for which prizes will be awarded.

Location of the party has not yet been determined. The Whitechurch Public School Board has been approached by letters and phone calls for the use of the Lake Wilcox Public School as in former years, but so far no definite answer has been received.

Apparently a new policy has been adopted in regard to use of school facilities after hours. At one time the community was given to understand that the school would be available for meetings and for the community bingos, which raise funds for community projects.

But last Wednesday the best thing crowd yet had to be told there could be no more bingos until further notice because the committee could find no suitable place to hold them.

It is suggested that a Lake Wilcox representative on the public school board could help solve the problem. Nominations will be held November 26, at the same time as those for township council.

The adult Halloween dance will be held at Vandorf Community Hall, November 6 at 8:30 pm. Door prizes, costume prizes and refreshments will be featured.
