## Take Initial Steps Kleinburg System

At last week's meeting of Vaughan Township Council a sequence of 13 different steps was outlined to be taken before the Community Planning Branch of the Department of Municipal Affairs will be able to sign the plan for registration.

The sequence was worked out at a joint meeting of council members together Planning Board, K. A. Reichert of OWRC, P. A. Deacon, chairman and John Hall, secretary of Vaughan Township Planning Board, John Spence of the development company and Ronald Freeman of the Kleinburg Ratepayers'

First step to be taken is the recommending of an amendment to the official plan by planning board; then

ning board of the proposed design of resubdivision, sewage treatment plant, sewer mains along with an examination of financial arrangements, including estimated servicing costs and the assurance of bonding arrangements. The board will also examine the detail of the

necessary zoning by-law. Mr. Spence's responsibility will be to complete financial arrangements with the ratepayers for financing of the project, following which planning board will poll the affected area for opposition or support of local ratepay-

Township council and Mr. Spence will then resolve details of an agreement, including detailed engineering costs and the posting of a

With this done, council will make application to OWRC for approval of plans thus far. Next, Mr. Spence will acquire a site for the

treatment plant. Township council will then advise planning board of arrangements and adopt an amendment to the official plan permitting the treatment plant,

Planning board will then pass on its comments on the plan to the Community Planning Branch and council will make application to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval of the sewer area.

Community Planning Branch will then offer its comments on conditions for its approval of the project and council will then be free to enact an amendment to its zoning by-law. This will require notification to all property owners in the area and if any of them object to the project, an OMB hearing would be called on it.

When this has been disposed of, Mr. Spence will next call for tenders on the work to be done.


