> Vaughan To Take and their sons Ricky and Randy Over Sherwood Cemetery

Vaughan Township will enact legislation making the township the owner of the abandoned cemetery on the Sherwood Sideroad, it was announced at last week's council meeting.

A search of title to the property by the township solicitor indicates that the last registered owner of the property was the Trustees of the Wesleyan Methodist Church Chapel and Burying Ground. It is believed that the United Church of Canada took over on union, the Wesleyan Methodist Church but the United Church denies any claim to the prop-

J. R. Strathy, owner of lands surrounding the cemetery is seeking to arrange conveyance of the land to him, subject to the provisions of the Cemeteries Act. Section 60 of this act

provides that where the owner of a cemetery cannot be found the council of the local municipality shall be deemed the owner. The act also gives authority for removal or rearrangement of monuments or gravestones.

#### Mother Presents Brief To Gov't C'tee By MARGARET MCLEAN

Where do you go for help for an emotionally disturbed

Mrs. T. A. Torrance of Maple finally went to the Ontario Legislature and last week presented a brief to the Select Committee on Youth which has been conducting hearings in various parts of the province for the last year. Mrs. Torrance complained

to the committee of a "woeful lack of facilities" for the treatment of disturbed children. During the years from age 7 to 15, her child was seen by private psychiatrists, child guidance clinics and psychologists, all of whom agreed she "had a problem" but none of whom offered treatment or advice to the parents on how to cope with the situation.

Finally, a medical doctor with a strong interest in mental health told the family of Warrendale, a residential treatment centre for disturbed children at Oak Ridges and the youngster was admitted there after years of heart-breaking trouble at elementary and secondary schools. After less than two years at Warrendale the teenager is back at home, able to hold a job. Regular out-patient care continues and the whole family is benefitting through coun-

"This kind of total approach," Mrs. Torrance told the committee, "is well worthy of public support and more official recognition."

While urging more centres

"There must be education for family living through the schools, to teach people awareness of their responsibilities to their children and themselves," said her brief. "Parenting is an art which can be taught and it must be learned by those who intend to embark on its sometimes stormy seas. We can no longer afford the cost of leaving it to instinct," she said. "We must teach the growth and development of human beings all along the

Quoting the Canadian Mental Health Association's description of the tide of mental illness as "the quiet disaster", she urged that action be taken now to control

Chief among her prescriptions is more teacher training to aid in the recognition of emotional disturbance in children while a course on the identification and help of emotionally disturbed children is offered at Toronto Teachers' College, Mrs. Torrance feels strongly that it should be compulsory and not just an option as at pres-

At the same time, she feels that primary teachers should be the most highly qualified, rather than the least qualified as is presently the case, as early identification of disturbance is most im-

in the total approach, Mrs. Torrance told "The Liberal". "There is too much skirting around. Parents often don't wish to recognize or accept difference in a child." They must be helped to become aware, she said, because if emotional disturbance come a long term case and

both parents and child. However, Mrs Torrance stressed that mental retardation and emotional disturbance should not be classed together, although they can exist in the same child. How to avoid emotional disturbance and how to recognize it should be taught. "When you face a hard reality, half the battle is won," she said. "Such acceptance is mandatory before the child or the parents can be helped.'

which Mrs. Torrance made to the committee included: that the province assume total financial responsibility for the care of disturbed children; that doctors, health nurses and teachers be included along with social workers in the treatment team; that school boards pay the cost of school fees if the child must leave his own community for treatment; that existing facilities be expanded, with more residential treatment centres; that primary grades be limited to not more than 25 pupils; that a Department of Youth be set up to co-ordinate all youth services so no child is overlooked, whatever his problems or resources.

in the preparation of a brief which was presented by the Ontario Association for Emotionally Disturbed Children to Ontario Premier John Robarts and his cabinet earlier Parents must be included this year. This brief included several pathetic case histories underlining the heartbreaking created by lack of assistance for emotionally disturbed children, by lack of recognition of their needs, and compounding of their problems when they are mistakenly admitted to reform institutions and those intended for the mentally retarded.

On reading a column by Lotta Dempsey in the Toronto Star last summer, entitled "And Nobody Waved Goodbye", Mrs. Torrance herself became the subject of a further column entitled "She Waves Hello". The first column was an account camp operated by Warrendale who had said that most of the children at the camp had never known love and


acceptance and that a real home was unknown to some of them; that when they went to camp "nobody waved goodbye".

"I'm one of the mothers who didn't wave goodbye," said Mrs. Torrance. "I was too heartbroken". Many of the parents were defeated and heart-weary when they found Warrendale, she said, they were parents who cared enormously but had made mistakes and had nowhere to turn.

The whole family has benefitted from Warrendale, reports Mrs. Torrance. Following counselling, both she and her husband were given IQ tests at the County Hospital, Newmarket. When these revealed very high potential (aptitude tests showed both would have made good physicians) they enrolled in night classes at Atkinson College of York University. Mrs. Torrance hopes to be able to work in the behavioral sciences herself someday and actively help troubled young people.

In reply to the Scriptural question "Am I my brothers" keeper". Mrs. Torrance answers in her brief, "In view of my own experience, acquired insight and personal involvement I must say, unequivocally, 'Yes'."
