tario Cross Country Intermediate Championship at Woodbridge.

He finished that rugged four mile course about 75 yards in front of his nearest competitor in a field of 400. It was the first time he had run four miles.

The meet had been billed as a duel between Doug Scorrar of Perth Collegiate who holds the Canadian Interscholastic two-mile record. It was no duel. Scorrar finished about ninth.

"It was Scorrar I was worried about," said Hamilton. "They told me he was pretty good. I got out in front of him and kept watching him. In fact while I was watching him somebody else went by me."

Hamilton said it was undoubtedly the most rugged course he had ever run.

"There were a lot of hills, real steep ones," he said. "I think I did more crawling than running. I had no special way of running the race. I just got out in front and tried not to let anyone catch up."

## Record Holder

Hamilton's previous record shows: Holder of the Canadian Midget one mile record at 4:24.3 set in Fredericton, NB; the fastest mile in the same bracket of 4:21.3 set in Buffalo.

His best time in the two miles is within three seconds of the Canadian Interscholastic two mile record now held by Scorrar who is a year older. He's the Georgian Bay Invitational Cross Country Champion.

In the recent International Silver Relays in Toronto he ran an extremely fine race to defeat many senior runners. Only three other runners have run the course faster.

They are Ron Wallingford, Dave Ellis — and Mr. Kidd.

The future? Two replies, one from Ken and the other from Coach Passmore.

Ken: "I'm going to continue my schooling and I intend to go to university. What one, I have no idea. I'm also going to keep running."

Passmore: "Ken will be competing in the Canadian Age Class Cross Country Championships in Vancouver November 27. His way is being financed by the government and partly by money donated by the Bayview Students' Council."

## To Try For 1968 Olympics

Still further in the future: "Ken right now appears to have unlimited potential," said Passmore. "Our objectives include a try for the 1968 Canadian Olympic Team and more especially the British Empire Games in 1970."

Passmore admits the Olympic try may be too early. Ken will be only 18 years old and the competition is tremendous but the Empire goal is clearly in sight.

"It's a worthwhile goal," concludes Passmore, "and I think he can do it."
