

Forecast Ward 4 Contest Town Public School Bd.

Because the December 4 election will see the beginning of two-year terms of office for all members of Richmond Hill Public School Board, as well as council, all eight seats will have to be filled. In the past, each ward has elected one trustee each year for a two-year term, with only one half the board up for election each year. Nominations are next Monday evening in the auditorium of Richmond Hill High School.

During this year provincial legislation made remuneration of trustees permissible on a scale based on enrollment. The local board set the remuneration at \$60 a month.

WARD I
Andrew Hutchison of 437 Taylor Mills Drive, who is completing one year as a representative of Ward I will stand for re-election. This year he has served on the building and the personnel committees.

Still undecided is Dave Stephenson who has served as chairman of the building committee. He told "The Liberal" that he would like to continue to serve as a trustee since he feels that his knowledge of the construction industry can contribute a great deal to the board, but finds the work time-consuming. If pressure of business will permit, he will stand for re-election.

Palmer Advances In College Drive

Markham Township Councillor Cleary Palmer continues to gather momentum in his drive to get a community college for the county generally, and the township preferably.

Mr. Palmer, who has been advocating a college since the idea was first broached by Education Minister Davis last winter, described the latest meeting he had held on the matter to Markham Township Council Monday afternoon.

He said he had met with various ministers of the area and they had all come out in favor of getting a college, as had a meeting of educationists the week before.

Mr. Palmer said that Rev. H. R. Howden of Holy Trinity Anglican, Thornhill, and Father C. J. Schwalm of St. Mary Immaculate Roman Catholic Church, Richmond Hill, had been appointed to a select committee to help prepare a brief on the colleges to Mr. Davis.

Another meeting on the colleges, which Mr. Palmer described as being "almost as important to this township as services," will be held November 19 at the township offices at 9 a.m. Attending the meeting will be various industrialists of the area.

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Local Youth One Of Two Markham Twp. Fatalities

Two fatalities on the same day - November 10 - in Markham Township last week brought the total in that area this year up to five.

Killed instantly in both cases were David Norman Thornton, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. David Thornton, 500 Lynett Crescent, and Dianne Wilson, seven, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allan Wilson, RR 2, Gormley.

The first accident occurred about 4.30 pm on Don Mills Road, just south of 17th Avenue, when the Wilson girl ran across the road and was struck by a car driven by William Ratcliffe, of 19 Main Street, Newmarket.

According to Markham Township Police, the girl had planned to visit a friend of hers across the road, and had come running out of the driveway of her house, passing behind a southbound truck into the path of the car.

The truck was killed about 8.20 pm on Bayview Avenue, near Rockport Crescent in Richmond Hill when he drove his motorcycle into the back of a parked truck on the east side of the street.

The truck was owned by Elwood Rose, 26 Rockport Crescent. Police said weather conditions were good in both cases. The second accident is still being investigated by Constable Allan Chadwick and charges are being considered.

Funeral service for Dianne Wilson were held Saturday morning from Ogdens Funeral Home, Agincourt, with Dr. A. F. Rimington, Victoria Square United Church, in charge.

Burial was in Highland Memory Gardens, Don Mills Road. Besides her parents, she is survived by a brother, Brian, and a sister Laurie, her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. A.

Wilson, Milliken, and Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Beamish, Agincourt. David Thornton is survived by his parents and two grandparents, Mrs. Norman O'Connell and Mrs. David Thornton. Funeral service was held Saturday afternoon from Pipher Funeral Home, with Rev. William Moore, St. Gabriel's Anglican Church, conducting the service.

Interment was in Richmond Hill Cemetery.

Police Arrest Hit-Run Driver

Ontario Provincial Police are seeking the driver of a car that collided with another vehicle and sent three people to hospital Saturday night, and then sped away.

According to OPP, Bond Lake, the hit-and-run car is believed to be a 1964 Ford Comet, turquoise in color.

The accident, which occurred at Highway 7 and Concession 5 in Markham Township, sent Mr. and Mrs. William Carter and their 12-year-old son, Michael, to York Central Hospital with injuries.

Mr. Carter and his son were released Sunday after treatment, and Mrs. Carter was taken off the critical list later in the day.

Police have arrested Paul Hartig, 48, of Oak Ridges, and charged him with failing to remain at the scene of an accident. He appeared in Magistrate's Court in Newmarket, Monday, and was remanded to November 29 on \$500 bail.
