Several Changes Possible In Whitechurch Council

Members of Whitechurch Township Council are playing it close to the vest this week and it looks as if residents will have to wait until nomination day, November 26 to be sure just who is running for what.

One definite candidate for council, however, is Patrick Cashman of Musselman's Lake, a defeated candidate in last year's election.

Main plank in Mr. Cashman's platform is the benefits to the township of a ward system. Having been unable to interest this year's council in seeking such a system for the township, Mr.

Cashman has filed a citizen's petition with the Ontario Municipal Board, signed by 180 residents, asking that the township be divided into wards. A public hearing on the question will be held December 9 at the township offices in Vandorf.

Mr. Cashman feels that a ward system would give township residents more equal representation on council and that a councillor representing just one ward could keep in closer contact with those he represents.

Only other person to take a definite stand on this year's elections is J. D. Smith of

Oak Ridges who was elected to council last year for the first time. Mr. Smith finds that pressure of a growing business is too great to permit him to give the necessary attention to township affairs and will not stand for re-election.

Ross Farquharson who has just completed his first term as reeve, has not yet decided whether he will seek office for another term, which this time would be for two years for the first time.

Mr. Farquharson served as deputy-reeve for two years, 1963 and 1964, having been first elected as councillor in

1959 and serving in that capacity until he moved up to the deputy-reeve spot. He is a resident of Lake Wilcox and a contractor.

Councillor Alvin Farmer, well-known auctioneer of Gormley will run for council again "unless some good men stand", but is not sure whether he may not contend for either the reeve or the deputy-reeve's chair. Mr. Farmer has served as councillor for three years.

After serving as councillor for two years and this past year as deputy-reeve, Stewart Burnett, a farmer of RR 2, Aurora is undecided whether or not to seek re-

election this year. He doesn't like the two year term and is not sure he wants to be tied up for that length of time.

Also undecided about seeking re-election is Councillor Ivan McLaughlin, a farmer at RR 2, Stouffville. After having served in past years as councillor, deputy-reeve and reeve, Mr. McLaughlin took a holiday for four years, then returned to serve as councillor for the past four years.

Nominations will take place at the Vandorf Community Hall, November 26 with elections Monday, December 6.
