

Town Says "Thank You" With Dinner And Dance

W. J. Taylor, former reeve of younger population who, with Richmond Hill and former warden of York County, was among those honored by town council at an appreciation night held at the Richmond Inn on November 4 at the Richmond Inn. In accepting the gift of cufflinks bearing the town crest at the annual event which is council's method of saying "thank you" to the people who serve as its representatives on various boards, without remuneration, Mr. Taylor made a welcome announcement. As a member of the Toronto and York Roads Commission, he forecast extension of reconstruction on Bayview Avenue two and a half miles north to the Stouffville Sideroad in the very near future.

Also honored was Ken Tomlin who served three years as councillor, five years as deputy-reeve and three years as mayor. In expressing his appreciation for the gift Mr. Tomlin recalled the very small and rather quiet community of Richmond Hill in 1947 when he and Mr. Taylor were both defeated in their first bid for a council seat. Both were elected to council in 1948 and worked hard against opposition to see that the town got an adequate sewage system.

With a touch of nostalgia he recalled the old Masonic Hall on Yonge Street, where nomination meetings, voting and election counts were held. "You had to be there to find out how the voting went," he noted. "As long as you have the right spirit you'll never take the spirit out of Richmond Hill and your town will never die," he told the 140 persons attending the dinner.

Harold Jones, who served four years as councillor, was also the recipient of the town cufflinks, which Mayor Thomas Broadhurst said were not given lightly but only for meritorious service to the town. "Bud" is still serving the town, this year over the annual nomination on the parks board and from 1960-4 on the arena board.

Councillor Lois Hancey introduced Lois Stanley of Leis, who last spring resigned 2 1/2 year old Jimmie Ross from the Mill Pond. The councillor referred to the teenager as a good example of the town's
