Vaughan Township Counis no longer interested the Kleinburg School property as a site for a Centennial Library, the township's public school board announced at its November 10 meeting.

Trustee Ross Jolliffe recalled that the school board had agreed to give the township a site 80 by 150 feet in the northwest corner of the Kleinburg School property. However plans for the building did not leave enough sideyard to meet the requirements of the township's by-law and it was reported that the committee waive the requirements in
