Indians Wallow Through Mud To Title Down Etobicoke 7-0 In Final Play-off

The Richmond Hill Indians swam, rowed, and splashed their way to the 1965 Metro Football Union championship Saturday over the Etobicoke Roughriders in a mud-pie making game.

It was strictly an endurance contest at Richmond Hill Town Park Swamp as the Indians edged the Roughriders 7-0 and 20-7 on the round to win the Lord Selkirk Trophy for the second straight year. They've won it three out of the last four years.

Hero of the day was Indians' Quarterback Ian McIntosh who slithered over from the one yard line near the end of the third quarter for the only touchdown of the day. McIntosh also opened the scoring with a 30 yard punt on the last play of the first half for a single.

"That was definitely the worst field we've ever played on this season," said a happy but mud-and-rain bedraggled Manager Del Madeley. "It was even worse than the week before. There was rain and mud this time - not just mud."

But the elements didn't stop the Indians who commanded control of the play through most of the game but just couldn't explode with the big gains in the mud.

"I was quite surprised with the rush we were able to put on their quarterback," said Madeley. "I didn't think we would because of the field conditions. They didn't have much luck throwing only one completion for three yards."

The Indians only heaved two passes - both were intercepted - both because of the mud and a jammed thumb which hampered the passing arm of Quarterback McIntosh. "As it turned out we didn't need to," said

Madeley, "and besides both passes were long ones and as good as kicks. They didn't hurt us." The Indians' only touchdown was set up when Rod Leonard recovered a fumble on the

enemy 15 yard line. Levi Snook and Vince Cas-

combe took it to the one and McIntosh finished the job.

But they might well have had another one if old dame crippler - the mud - hadn't stepped

"We tried a play we've been saving for the big game all year," said Madeley, "and it would have worked except for the weather."

It came off a fake reverse to Bob Sheridan in the third quarter with McIntosh retaining the ball and bootlegging it to the opposite field.

"Ian picked up 12," Madeley stated, "and was in the clear when he cut in and slipped. That was it." But there were more defensive plays than of-

fensive ones with Manager Madeley singling out Charlie Dunn, linebacker, and Fred Parsons, middleguard, as his standouts. "They put the big rush on all day and instilled

a lot of spirit into the team," said Madeley. For offence he put the finger of praise on

quarterback McIntosh, Snook, Cascomb, and Sheridan.

"Every time we really needed a first down they got it for us."

Another big defence aid was Bill Tackaberry who missed the first game. "He cut their end runs down to nothing," said Madeley.

Madeley had high praise for the tough Etobicoke team it was the "toughest series we've ever been in. I was worried until about the middle of the fourth quarter. It was definitely nice to get it over with and be the winner."

Only near-fatality was to outside linebacker Len Taschuck who almost drowned.

He tried to fall on a loose ball and succeeded only too well.

"About eight other guys jumped on him," said Madeley, "and I thought we were going to have to dig him up. There was so much mud on him he couldn't see. We had to lead him off the field."
