"It's basically a young club," said Bruce, with membership age running from 30 to 50 years on the average. There are 50 single men members and 50 single lady members which is very nice but there is no logic behind it. It has just worked out that way.

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## Vaughan May Be Site Of 50,000 Seat Big League Ball And Sports Stadium

While discussion has raged back and forth at meetings of the City of Toronto's Board of Control as to whether the city should sponsor or permit a 50,000 seat sports stadium at the present site of the Don Valley Golf Course in Hogg's Hollow, a Toronto firm has been working for the past nine months on a similar private project.

Eddie Donnenfield, president of Romdon Estates confirmed recently that his firm is planning such a stadium at the intersection of Highway 7 and 400 in Vaughan Township, although he admitted there was still a great deal of work yet to be done both in planning and financing the venture.

Hoped for is a complex built around a 50,000 seat domed sports stadium and including a closed shopping mall, curling and skating rinks, theatres, bowling alleys and places to dine. The stadium would be suitable for both football and major league baseball.

Mr. Donnenfield reported that they had discussed the plan with the Maple Leaf Ball Club and with the Argonauts and had discussed bus transportation with the TTC, which had indicated that it would provide bus service for the project. He noted that with Highway 7 newly widened, the Spadina Expressway coming up to Highway

7 and Jane and Keele Streets widened and paved there would be good facilities to handle big crowds. Parking space for 25,000 cars is planned.

Mr. Donnenfield stressed however that mortgaging was still to be arranged and another \$18 million was still to be arranged to finance the \$30 million dollar venture. "What we are thinking about is not something for now, or today. It is a plan to provide for the future when Toronto has grown into a city of perhaps seven million people," he was quoted as saying.

Provisional blessing has been given to the project by Vaughan Township Council, which asked however that Mr. Donnenfield supply more detailed information before definite approval could be given.

"We didn't discourage it in any way," Reeve A. H. Rutherford told "The Liberal," "but we asked them to come back when their plans were more definite."

Mr. Rutherford added, too, "They'll never find a better site for such a development," noting that traffic arteries lead to the spot from all directions. He stated that council had been shown an attractive architect's drawing of the development which included also a service centre and motel.
