Deer Harvest Is Down One-Third Over Last Year

The three day open deer season checked by conservation officers in November in the six of the Ontario Department of southern townships of Simcoe Lands and Forests is reported County resulted in from fair to The number of hunters increased good hunting. A minimum killed about 16% from last year of 100 deer for the 500 hunters while the harvest decreased ap-

proximately one-third. Best success was noted in the Township of Innisfil where at least a 25% hunter success figure was recorded. The six townships in this report are Ad-jala, Tecumseth, West Gwillim-bury, Essa, Tossorontio and Innisfil.

Fog and rain during the early morning of the 1965 season's opening day hampered hunters and was no doubt one of the main factors in the lower har-vest this year. High water in the marshes was also a con-tributing factor. Early fall rains filled most marshes where deer are normally found.

The 1964 hunter success ratio was 30%, with this year's being down about one-third.
