Gary Charity scored on a pass from Gord Sales and Greg Stephan for the Richmond Hill team at 1:15; Norm McLeod, assisted by Dennis Tomcheski and Gord Sales, scored at 6:45; and Charity assisted by Rick Chalklin got his second goal of the period at 18:05 to end the scoring.

Friday in Bolton arena, Borks juveniles lost 3-1 to the host team. The local hockey team was hampered by poor ice conditions and bad lighting in the arena, it is reported.

Sunday, Borks took on Camp Borden Colts in an exhibition game at that army town's arena. Richmond Hill were the victors to the tune of 12-8.

Camp Borden opened the scoring, with Jimmy Zubek tying the score with an unassisted goal. Stewart from Charity put Borks one up, but Camp Borden came back to tie the game up. Greg Stephan assisted by Charity, scored the locals' third goal, with Camp Borden retaliating again. Then Charity, unassisted, made the score 4-3 for Richmond Hill at the end of the first period. Four penalties were handed out.

Camp Borden tied it up again and Borks countered with three goals in a row. Stephan assisted by Stewart, Mabley assisted by Steve Black, Charity completing his evening's hat trick, assisted by Stephan and Stewart, scored these counters. Camp Borden made it 7-5 at the end of the second period, which saw five penalties.

Camp Borden tied the score again in the third period with two quick goals. Then Mabley unassisted on one goal and assisted by Chalklin and Charity on his third goal of the evening, and Larry Richards unassisted put Borks in the lead again. Camp Borden got their eighth goal and Rick Chalklin unassisted and Steve Black scored on a pass from Zubek to make the final score 12-8.

There were 16 penalties in the third period which saw a minor donnybrook break out in the last five minutes of play which resulted in six players being sent to the penalty box for fighting.

The Borks' players found the ice good in the Camp Borden arena and the Colts a good host club. The Colts have twice this season beaten Orillia which is reckoned to be the top opposition the local juveniles will meet in league play. The Colts had been unbeaten this season until Saturday night.

Borks have won four out of five games in league play this season so far.

Camp Borden Colts will play a return game in Richmond Hill on December 29.
