Peewees Garner Another Trophy "B" Champions Belleville Tourney

One of the best games of his hockey season was played last Tuesday night at Newmarket as Richmond Hill Lions Peewees ousted Newmarket from the North York League playoffs. Final score was 10-2 for the Lions.

John Barnett, assisted by Ron McEwen and Dick Weber, opened the scoring at the two minute mark. Leftwinger John Ranieri got the second goal at the four minute mark on a pass from Dick Weber and brother Bill Weber unassisted made the score 3-0 at 12:30 of the first period.

In the second period the team came up with their new playing pattern and Bill Weber, assisted by Chris Andrews, got his second goal of the game at two minutes. Fifty seconds later he completed a hat trick, assisted by Barnett. Brother Dick sank a pass from Larry Kellett and Ranieri at the eight minute mark. Newmarket refused to be left off the scoring sheet and at 9:15 managed to get a tally, making the score at the end of the second period 6-1.

By the time the third period opened, Newmarket had got on to the Lions' new play pattern and held them scoreless for 10 minutes and 20 seconds. Andrews assisted by Kellett scored at this point and 10 seconds later Newmarket retaliated with their second goal. At 12:50 Barnett got his second goal, assisted by Mike Ball and Dick Weber and a minute later came up with a third goal to earn a hat trick. He was assisted by An-

draws on this one. With two minutes remaining in the game, the Weber brothers co-operated on a goal, Bill hitting the target for his fourth counter of the game. This was the worst defeat a Richmond Hill team has ever handed a Newmarket team. Coach Ray Brooks credits this to the fact his boys have been playing in "A" competition lately and have improved their game. Friday the Lions played the Richmond Hill Bantam Second All-stars, killing off one penalty in a scoreless first period. The Lions really started to roar in the second period, with Barnett getting the first goal at 32 seconds. He was assisted by Dick Weber and Ball. Ranieri put the puck in the net on a pass from Kellett and Robbie Sackfield at 14:03, and a minute later Chris Andrews made it 3-0 unassisted. Being a little overconfident, the Lions relaxed as the third period opened and the 2nd All Stars capitalized on this lapse with Don Brown, Brian Oliver and Paul Brown clicking for a goal. At 5:47, Steve Cronkwright broke away to flip a pass from Chris Andrews into the net. The All-Stars fought hard and at 8:47 scored again, Brian Oliver, assisted by Paul Brown, being the marksman.

Saturday the Lions played the Peterboro "AA" team in the Belleville Tournament and lost a hard, fast game 3-1. Bill Weber got the only goal for the Hillers. However, one of the Lions' goals was disallowed and a disputed goal was awarded to Peterboro.

In the second game, the local boys polished off the Ajax representatives in fine fashion, counting eight goals and with Goalie Dave

Addley registering a shut-out.

McEwen led the scoring spree with four goals and appeared to have glue on his stick. He was assisted on the first by Bill Weber and Ranieri, on the second by Stokes and Andrews, on the third by Stokes and was unassisted on the fourth. He was picked as the first star of the game.

Ranieri earned the second star, contributing an unassisted goal to the total. Steve Cronkwright was assisted by Andrews, Bill Weber by Cronkwright and John Barnett by Sackfield on their counters.

The third star was awarded to the Ajax goalie because of the stops he made during the game as the Lions bombed him throughout.

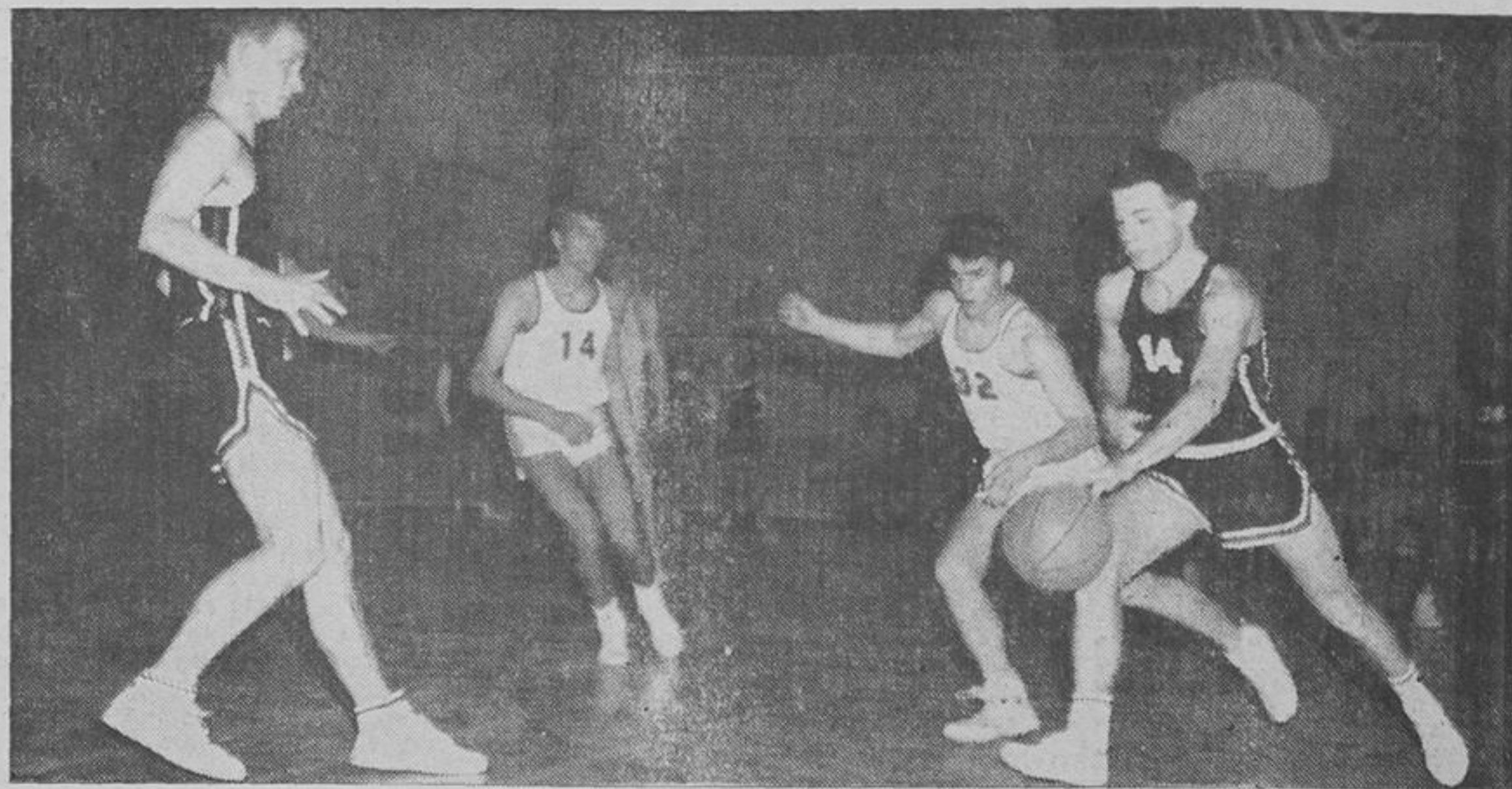
The Lions earned another trophy and the championship of the "B" division of the tournament, as they topped Kingston in the third game of the day.

Starting Date For Road Race April 30

Starting gun for the Second Annual Richmond Hill Rose Bowl Road Races won't sound until April 30 but organizing officials are already off and running.

Committee Chairman Derrick Milner, of Oak Ridges, and members Councillor William Lazenby, John Passmore and Ed Brown ironed out preliminary plans for the big meet Wednesday night of last week in a meeting held at the municipal building.

Foremost on the agenda was the decision to purchase three main rose bowl trophies plus other awards at a total cost of \$200.

Mr. Lazenby said cost of the awards would be taken out of savings on expenses last year and would cover the amount required.

About 200 athletes from across the provinces are expected to participate in the five planned races for which sanction has been granted by the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada for athletes registered with it.

Chairman Milner said that due to the great success and popularity of last year's event a local elementary school race for boys has been included. This race," he said, "will be about three quarters

of a mile and will start and finish on Newkirk Road."

Prizes will be awarded in two age groups of 12 years or under and 13 years or over. Plaques and medals will be presented to the first three finishers in each age group.

There is no entry fee for elementary school participants. Registration forms will be mailed out to various high schools, elementary schools and track clubs throughout Ontario.

The senior, junior and juvenile segment of the races will cop the major share of the spotlight with expected entries from such well known Canadian athletes including Dave Ellis, Toronto Olympic (senior); Ron Wallingford and Gord Dickson, Hamilton A.C. (senior); Dave Savage, Toronto Olympic (junior); Ken Hamilton, Bayview Secondary School (juvenile).

Other big names likely to be in attendance will be such outstanding international names as Abby Hoffman, Maureen Wilton, and Roberta Picco of the Don Mills Track Club.

Mr. Milner and other members of the committee commented on the success of last year's show and added that "such a race encourages

young people to take an interest in track and field activities."

The races to be held are: Senior (Over 20 years), two laps of course, A, 7½ miles; Junior (under 20 yrs.), one lap of course A, 3¾ miles; Juvenile (under 18 years), two laps of course B, three miles; Midget (under 16 years), two laps of course B, three miles; Ladies (Open), lap of course C, ¾ mile; elementary schools (a), 13 and over, one lap of course C, ¾ mile; and (b) 12 and under, one lap of course C, ¾ mile.

The courses in general will follow a route from Newkirk Road and Centre Street, down Markham Road to Bayview Avenue and back.

The 1965 records and current holders for the races are:

1. Senior, 35 minutes, 54.8 seconds, Dave Ellis, Toronto Olympic Club; Junior, 18 minutes, 12.6 seconds, Dave Savage, Toronto Olympic Club; 3 Juvenile, 14 minutes, 16.5 seconds, Dave Smith Bayview Secondary School; 4. Midget, not held; 5 Ladies, four minutes, 14 seconds, Abby Hoffman, Toronto Olympic Club; 6 (a) Elementary, four minutes, 20 seconds, Jeni Ball, Crosby Public

School; (b) Elementary, four minutes, 31 seconds, Bob O'Toole, Our Lady Help of Christian Separate School. Other members of the committee include Eric Crump, in charge of publicity; and Pat Smith, honorary chairman.

The majority of the funds for the committee was donated by commercial organizations last season. It is hoped a grant will be forthcoming from town council.



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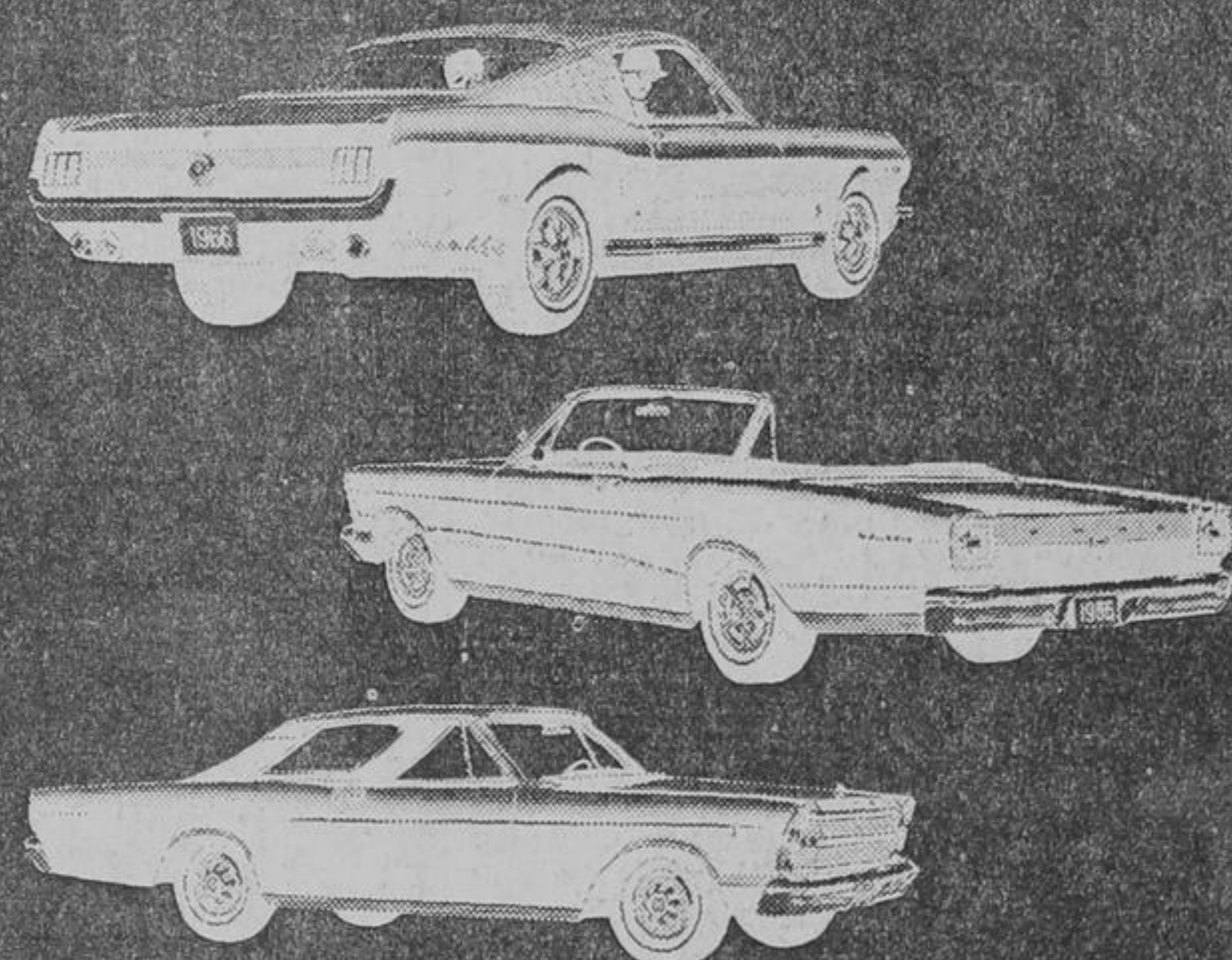
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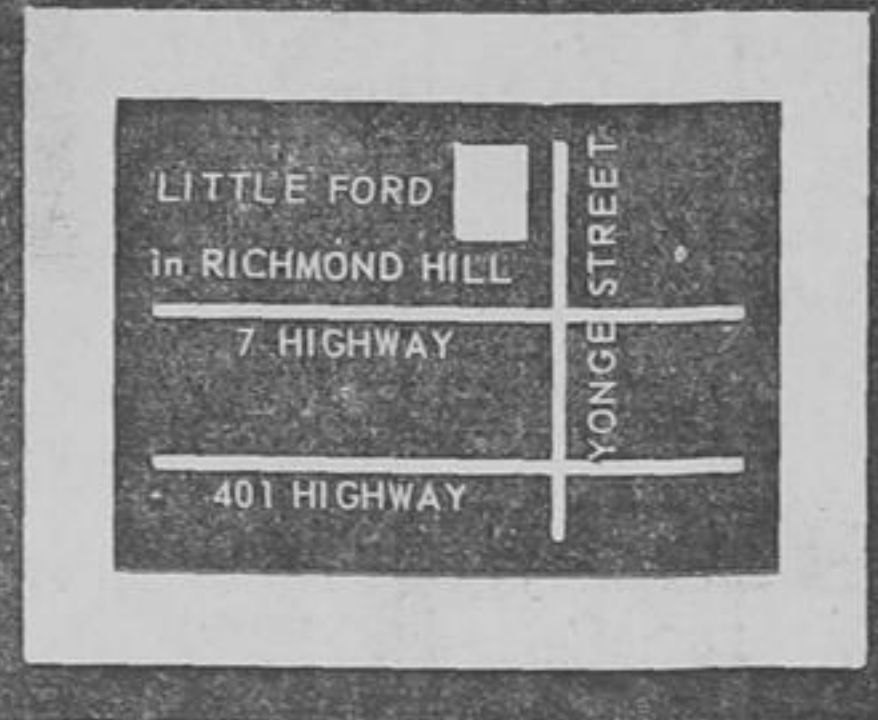
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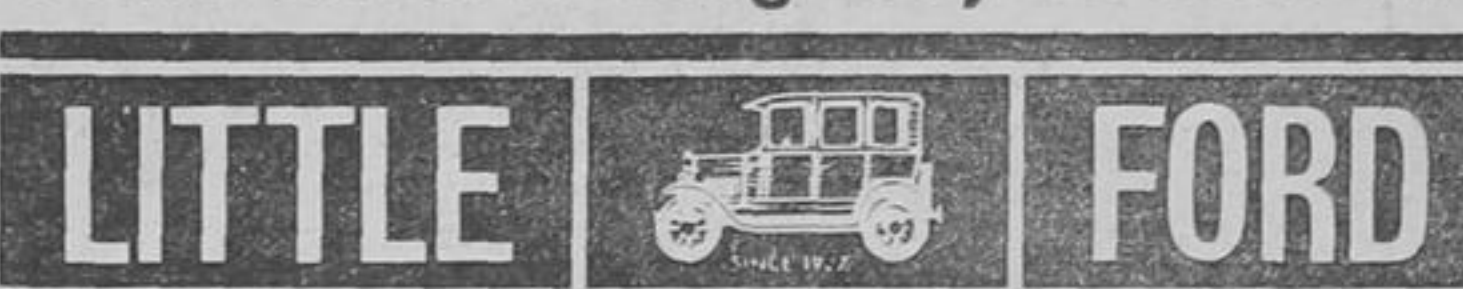
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
