A panel discussion featured the program at Headford UCW May 10 at the home of Mrs. Harry Burton. The subject was "Resource Material For Vital Christian Living."

Guest panelist, Mrs. P. Bennett, Victoria Square, laid the foundation by presenting the Bible as the most important resource. She reviewed the advance in scholarship, the fresh discoveries made by archaeologists such as Dead Sea Scrolls and the constant search for a more complete meaning of the Word.

Mrs. Burton, second panelist reviewed the articles in the Observer. Through its pages windows open on the world, in international matters, political and religious; world church work by on-the-spot workers, pertinent family problems and the question box, often amusing but always to the point with pithy advice. This paper is a resource that stimulates thought.

The material of the third panelist, who was unavoidably absent, dealt with active personal resources. Loyalty makes it imperative that one's beliefs be expressed in honest communication with fellowmen; loyalty should promote understanding rather than tolerance. Members should have an understanding of the active work of the whole church and have the knowledge to defend its position when worthy of defence. Members should loyally accept and offer criticism and in all walks of life live according to Christian ethics. Mrs. L. Guild acted as moderator.

Mrs. Stewart Rumble conducted the devotional service, continuing the lessons from Luke. She told the story of the women who served Jesus, "on the road," from village to village, from town to town. They were Mary of Magdala, a sinner; Joanna, a lady of the court, wife of Herod's minister of finance; and Susanna, a follower. The lesson clearly teaches that the Church needs to know how to yoke in common harness the diverse talents of her members.

Magistrate Admits Statement In Trial Of Youth On Armed Robbery

Lindsay Lemire, 17, of Ottawa, was convicted last week in Magistrate's Court, Newmarket, on a charge of armed robbery.

Lemire, along with Paul Hemming, 19, of Langstaff, was charged with sticking up Becker's Milk Store, Langstaff, March 30, and escaping with more than \$250 in cash.

At sittings last week in Richmond Hill and Newmarket, Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake listed the voir dire evidence on a statement given by Lemire to Vaughan Township Police after he was arrested April 23 in Ottawa.

He was brought back to Toronto by Constables Robert Smallbone and Arnold Leeder, and was taken straight to a Metro division in Willowdale, where he was at first questioned by officers there on another charge.

During the voir dire, Defence Counsel Donald Plaxton, argued against admitting the statement on the grounds that some intimidation had been used by police to make him sign.

Oak Ridges Man Killed In Western Ont. Crash

Carl Kent, 28 of Oak Ridges was one of two men killed Thursday when the car in which they were passengers struck a bridge abutment near Court-right. This is a small community on the St. Clair River, 15 miles south of Sarnia.

Police said the car, a 1965 Mustang convertible, was torn in two by the impact. The dead men, Mr. Kent and Bruce Miller Craig of West Hill, were riding in the back seat. Eugene McLaren of West Hill and Stanley Peteski of Hagersville, driver, are both in hospital with severe injuries.

All four men were construction workers employed in building the new \$220 million Ontario Hydro Lambton generating station at Courtright.
