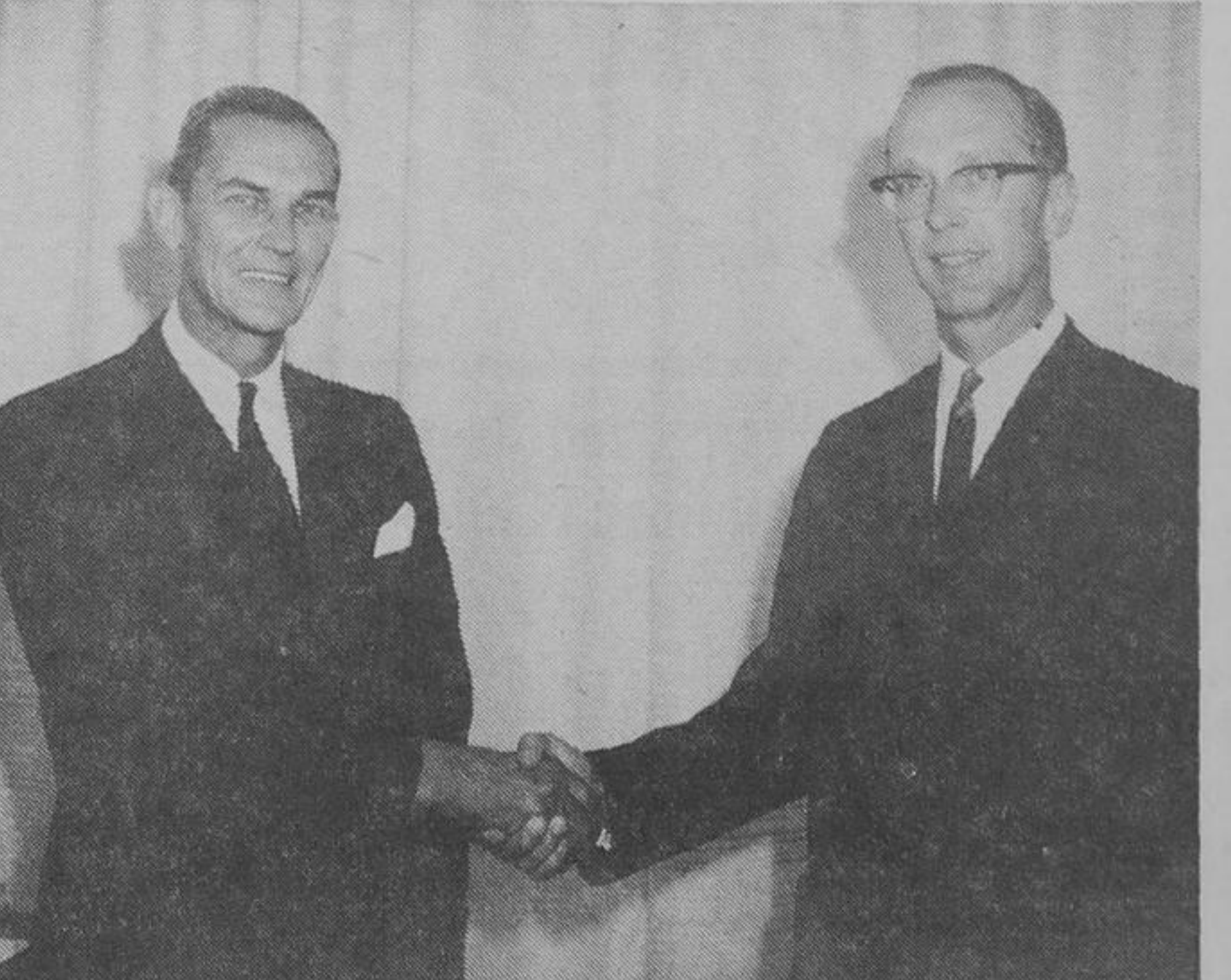
HOW C.C.S. FUNDS WERE SPENT IN 1964
