## Ride From "Nice, Friendly Cop" Led Straight To Jail For Youth

"A nice friendly cop came along and gave me a lift", and as a result, 20-year old Donald Cowan of Toronto, found himself in jail, along with two of his friends, Magistrate's Court was told last week.  
Cowan, Karczewski, 17, and Sybille Maier, 18, both of Toronto, were charged with breaking, entering and theft from Western Produce, Highway 7, Woodbridge, November 24.  
According to a statement taken from Cowan, and read by Vaughan Township Police Constable John Scott, Cowan and Karczewski borrowed a car and picked up Miss Maier and another youth. They then drove around awhile, and Cowan and Karczewski left the car and went to the produce company. They knocked the glass out of the front door with a brick and loaded up with 24 cartons of cigarettes, 13 packages of cigars and a quantity of chocolates.  
Cowan said that Miss Maier had not known anything about their plans.  
When they returned to where they left the car, Cowan said, it was gone, "and the next thing I knew the police were all around".

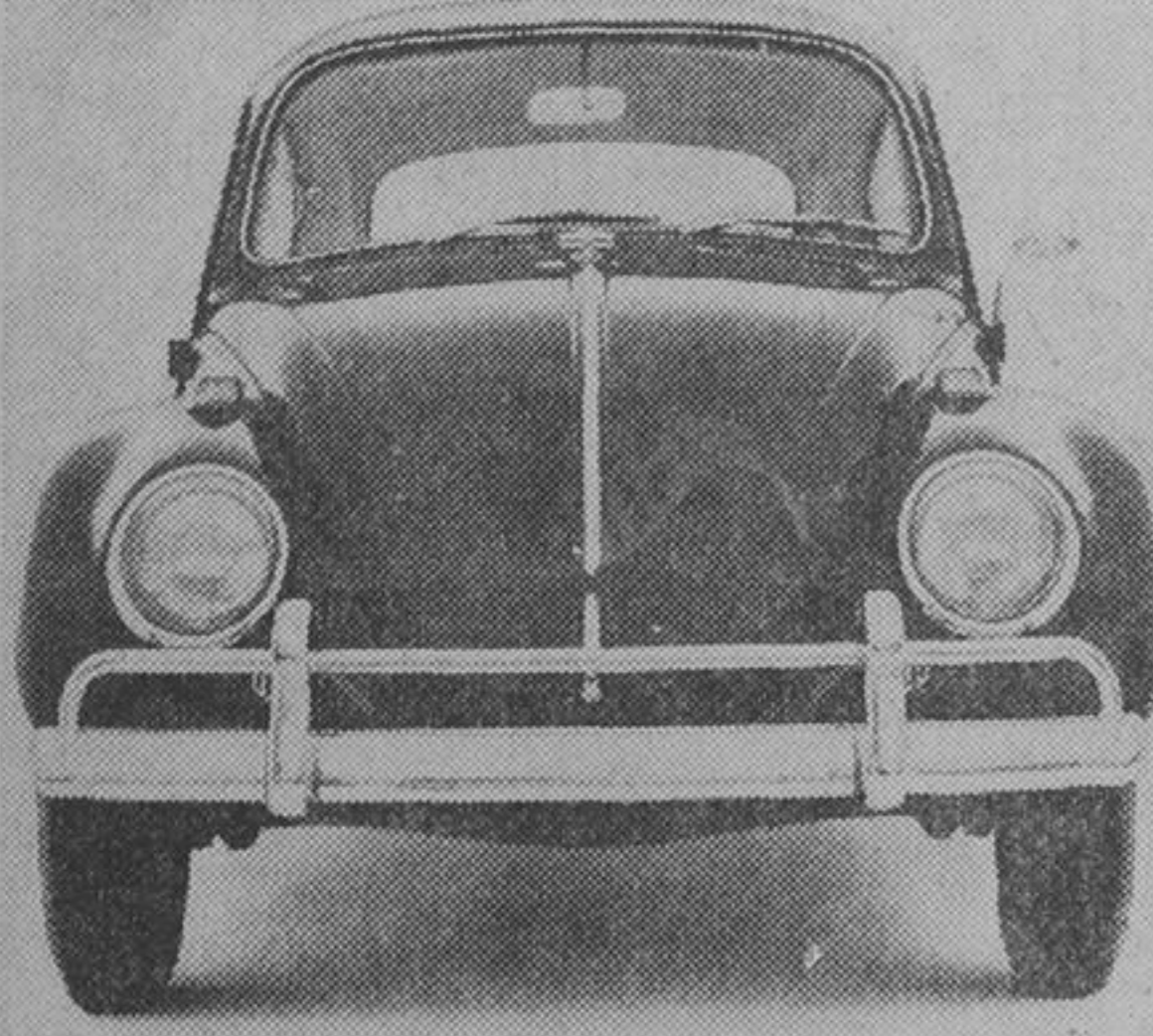

Markham Township Council last week approved a request from a resident to divide his remaining lots under the same basis as he did before the rural area bylaw came into effect.

Under the new bylaw, lots are restricted to 25 acres in size, with a minimum of one acre under any subsequent rezoning.

In a lawyer's letter, the Toronto firm of Kennedy and Kennedy said its client had land at Bayview Avenue and Hillsview Drive, 500 ft. by 150 ft. He had built three homes with 150-foot frontages by permission of the committee of adjustment, and asked to divide the remainder the same way.

Council agreed.

Council will give study to a resolution from the Town of Lindsay asking for support in

its campaign to lower education costs.  
The Lindsay resolution called for the provincial government to amend the statutes to provide authority for all municipalities to levy a fixed mill rate through taxation, based on provincial equalized assessment for elementary and secondary schools, with the province assuming the balance of cost of such education in each municipality.

Councillor Anthony Roman said the high cost of education was of concern to the township and it was time it threw its weight behind the direction it wants the department to take.

A request from the parks board for an extra \$2,250 for parks capital expenditures, not provided for in the current budget, was referred to the works committee for further study.

Among the items wanted were: a half-ton, 1964 pickup truck, \$850; one front-end loader and power-steering tractor, \$1,050; plus cab, \$350, to be used for snow removal on rinks and for general park purposes.

Council also received several written objections to its South Thornhill Bylaw, which will be forwarded to the OMB for consideration at its public hearing.

Council conveyed a piece of property at the north-west corner of 18th Avenue in Victoria Square, to York County for road-widening purposes.
