**Shopping Plaza Accident Results
In Three Injuries And One Charge**

Three persons were injured in a two-car collision in a Markham Village Shopping Plaza November 28.

Injured were the two drivers, Peter Kerr, 74, Markham, and Maria Piccio, 32, Downsview, a student driver; and Piacentino Fedele, 28, Downsview, a passenger in the Piccio car.

The three were all treated at Scarborough General Hospital.

Police said the accident occurred when the Kerr car turned in front of the other vehicle, resulting in a head-on collision.

Mr. Kerr has been charged with making an improper left turn.

An accident on Highway 11 at the Mulock Sideroad December 3, sent five people to York County Hospital, Newmarket, for treatment of injuries.

Injured were Michael Schurman, 20, Aurora; Bryan Windsor, Willowdale; Mrs. Thelma

Woodhouse, 52, of Scarborough; her daughter, Margaret Jones, 29, of Aurora, and her daughter, Wendy 6.

OPP, Oak Ridges, who investigated, said the accident occurred when a car driven by Schurman, going north on No. 11, was forced to swerve while in the passing lane and struck the Windsor vehicle. Schurman's car then spun broadside in the southbound lane and was in collision with the Woodhouse car.

An OPP constable's good memory resulted in the arrest of a youth, who was wanted by North Gwillimbury Township Police.

Constable C. P. McBride spotted the youth walking through Oak Ridges, and recognized him from a description put out by York County police radio.

Arrested was John Charles Johnston, 16, who was wanted on three charges of break, enter and theft.

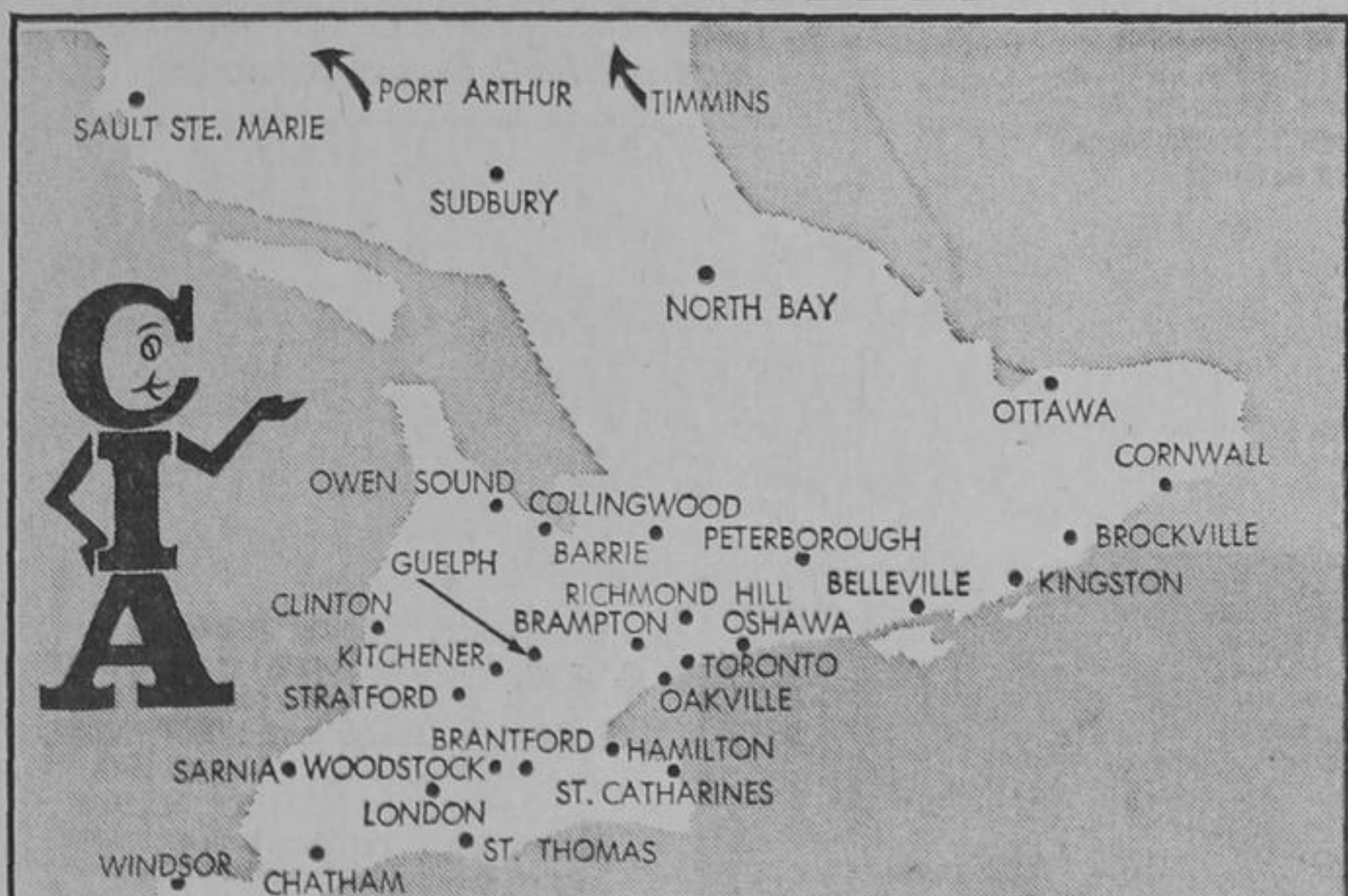
