Paid Taxes On Extra 10 Acres

Reeve Ross Farquharson was startled to hear the Latin phrase "caveat emptor" at a recent council meeting. The words were used by Mrs. Joy Heather, Mobile Road, Toronto, and the translation is "Let the buyer beware."

Mrs. Heather told Whitchurch Township Council that for 10 years she paid taxes on 69 acres of land, when in effect, the property contained only 59 acres. She claimed that she had overpaid about \$65 per year. The assessment error has now been corrected, however Mrs. Heather will not be receiving a rebate of her overpayments.

Reeve Farguharson pointed out that it was not the duty of council to examine individual tax bills. He told the appellant that a court of revision is held each year to take care of such discrepancies. Since she had not appealed to the court of revision no rebate can now be approved.
