A SINCERE VERY MERRY CHRISTMAS
Memories of a Christmas Dinner 23 years ago probably still haunt those gallant members of the Loyal Edmonton Regiment and the Seaforth Highlanders of Canada who found themselves on Christmas Day, 1943, in a savage life and death struggle with the enemy in the town of Ortona on the Adriatic Coast of Italy.

Clearing the town of the enemy house by house in some of the fiercest fighting encountered by the Canadians in Italy, the two battalion commanders contrived to provide real Christmas Dinners for their fighting men. In a church captured by the Seaforths, tables were laid with white cloths, and the rifle companies were relieved in succession, each for two hours, for the festivities.

At the same time the 48th Highlanders and the Hastings and Prince Edward Battalions, pushing west of the town to cut the coast road and to the enemy's communications, became wholly cut off and missed their dinner on Christmas Day when supplies were delayed because of the rain, mud and mines.

Series Of 7 Science Seminars

York Central District High School Board is this year, for the third time, sponsoring a series of "science seminars" during which senior students of good academic standing visit various universities for a lecture and demonstration of some phase of science.

Purpose of the trips is to introduce the students to the universities which they may be considering attending, to provide some insight into academic life beyond grade 13, to take part in a brief development of some aspect of science either beyond the grade 13 level or in greater depth than the curriculum allows and to foster the developing spirit of comradeship among York Central's five schools.

The visits have been planned by a committee of York Central science heads. Two trips will be made this year to York University, the closest campus, and one each to Toronto, Scarborough College, Guelph, Waterloo and McMaster. The trips are made on Wednesday afternoons and the students enjoy a lecture, a meal in the university dining hall, a tour of the premises and then do experimental work in science laboratories, being brought home again by bus at 9 pm.

The first trip of the series took place December 7 and the following account of it has been contributed by Loren Gordon of Richmond Hill High School:

Approximately 20 students from Bayview, Thornhill, Woodbridge and Richmond Hill High Schools boarded a York Central District High School bus December 7 bound for the modern expanding Keele Street campus of York University. This trip, one of seven to various universities for science seminars, was to give grade 13 students a general insight into university academic life.

Head of the Physics Department Dr. R. W. Nicholls headed this particular seminar. He gave a lecture on the circular motion of rigid bodies and the concepts of centripetal acceleration.

After the lecture and dinner in the impressive flag-becked dining hall, any newly acquired knowledge was put to practical application in the physics laboratory. Groups of three students, each from a different school, performed two experiments directly related to Dr. Nicholls' lecture. Following this came two demonstrations of relatively expensive laboratory apparatus, a laser light beam and an air trough.

Final item of interest was examination of the computers in use at the university. Drs. K. A. Innenin and R. P. Meachran gave brief but informative talks on the amazing speed and capabilities of these "thinking machines".
