Once Maple Resident S.R. Bailie Passes At Orangeville December 15

Seventeen grandchildren and one great-grandchild survive a former resident of Toronto, Maple and Orangeville, Samuel Robert Bailie who passed away December 15, age 66 at Dufferin Area Hospital, Orangeville.

Born in Dundalk, Ireland, Mr. Bailie married the former Ethel Atkins in Toronto in 1919. He established Bailie Printing Service in Orangeville with his son Calvin but retired three years ago and had spent the time since travelling in Canada and the U.S. He was a Past Master of Fairbank L.O.L. 2261 and a member of Fairbank A. F. & A. M. 592. He also belonged to the Irish Regiment of Canada.

Together with his wife, Mr. Bailie is survived by five children, daughters Mrs. J. Boron (Audrey), of Concord and Mrs. J. A. Whaley (Elva), of Richmond Hill, and three sons, Warren, of Thornhill, who is Vice-Chairman of Vaughan Township School Board, Calvin of Orangeville and Ross of King City.

Funeral service was conducted December 17 by Rev. A. Coyle of Orangeville Baptist Church at Dods Funeral Home, Orangeville with interment at Maple Cemetery.
